Getting Familiar with Your Computer

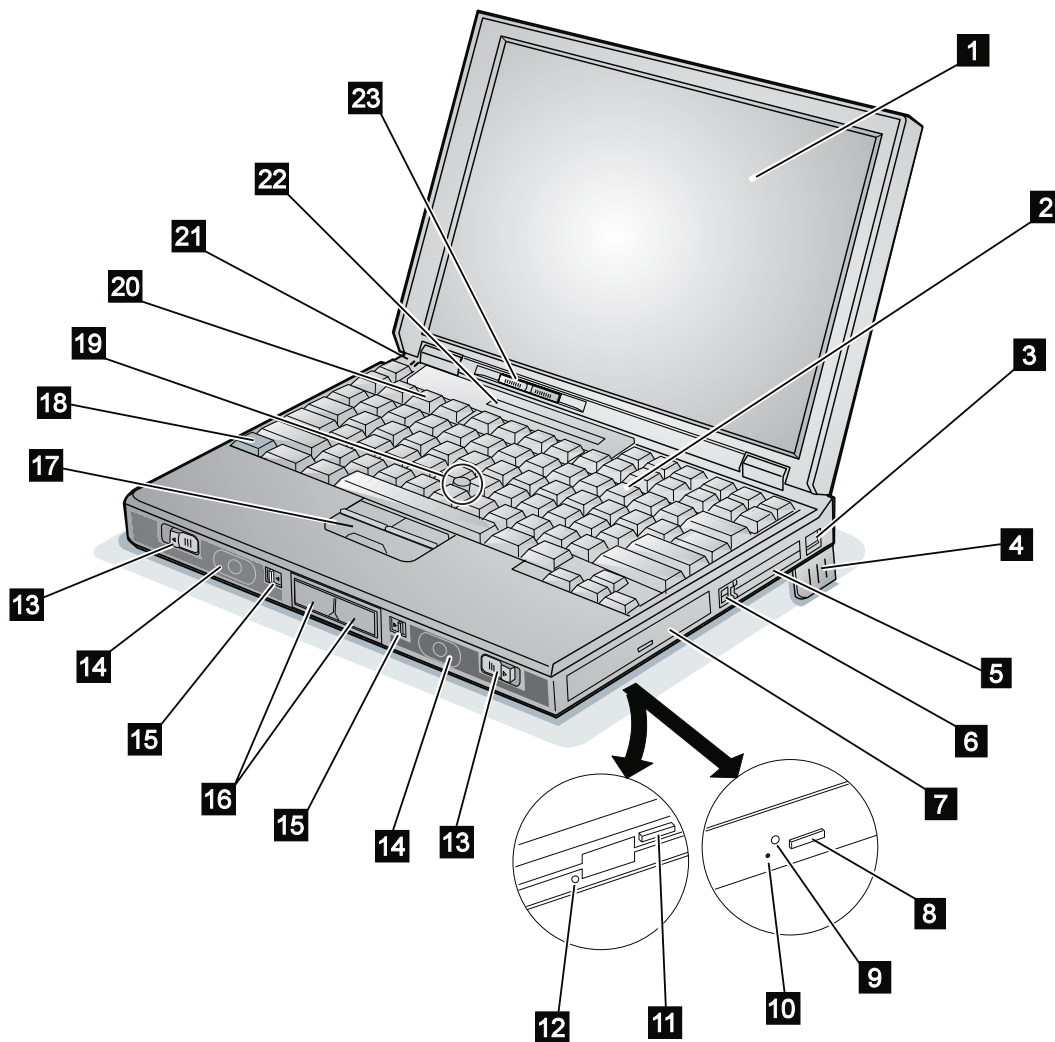
This chapter provides basic information about your computer.

To power off the computer, hold the power switch for just a second and release it. Wait at least 5 seconds before powering on again (or resuming normal operation from suspend or hibernation mode).

Front View

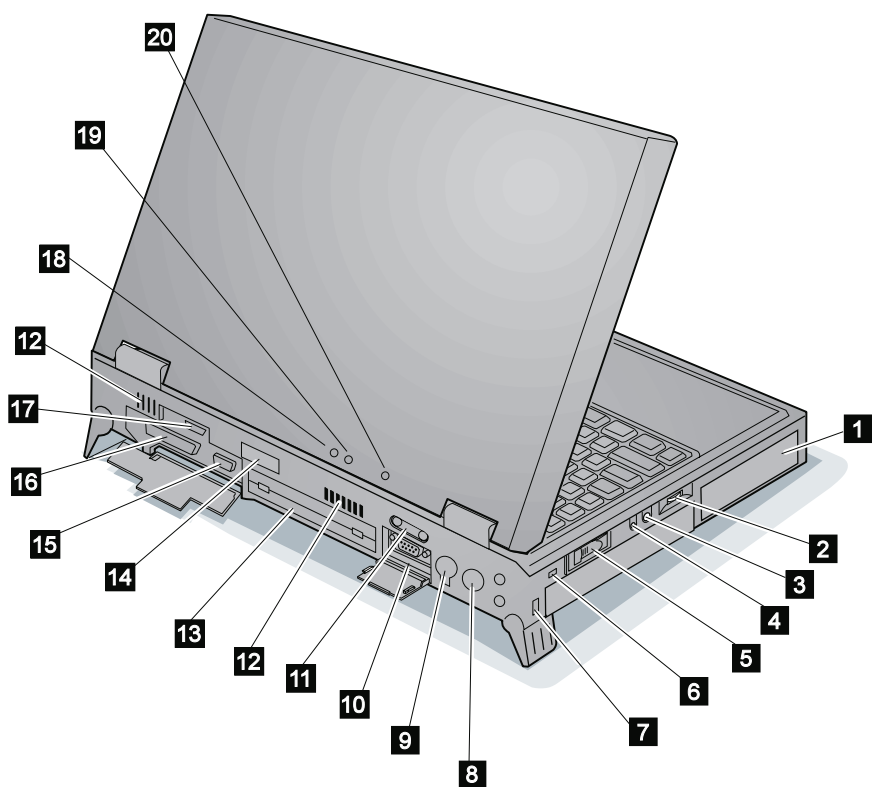


Identifying the Hardware Features

- 1 The **liquid crystal display (LCD)** displays text and graphics.
- 2 The **numeric keypad** is used for typing numbers in **NumLk** mode.
- 3 The **internal modem port** (also called the **telephone jack**), provided on some models, is used for connecting your computer to a telephone line.
- 4 The **legs** can be extended to angle the keyboard for more comfortable typing.
- 5 The **PC Card slots** accept a PC Card, CardBus Card, or Zoomed Video (ZV) Card. The **eject buttons** 6 eject the PC Cards from the slots.
- 7 The **UltraBay II** is used for inserting various devices such as a CD-ROM drive, diskette drive, DVD-ROM drive, a secondary hard disk drive, and a secondary battery pack.
- 8 The **eject button** ejects the tray from the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive.
- 9 The **drive-in-use indicator** goes on when data is being read from a CD-ROM or a DVD-ROM in the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive. Do not enter suspend mode or eject a disc when this indicator is on.
- 1 The **emergency eject hole** is used to eject the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM tray when it does not open with the eject button 8 . Insert a pin to eject the tray.
- 11 The **diskette eject button** ejects a diskette from the diskette drive.
- 12 The **diskette drive-in-use indicator** goes on when data is being written to or is being read from a diskette. Do not enter suspend mode or eject a diskette when this indicator is on.
- 13 The left and right **cover release latches** open the LCD when they are slid outward.
- 14 The left and right **internal speakers** generate stereo sound.
- 15 The left and right **release latches** release the left and right **bay eject levers** 16 , which release any device in the battery bay or the UltraBay II, respectively. The right release latch contains a **bay LED** that indicates when you can safely remove a device from the UltraBay II.
- 17 The **left click**, **right click**, and **center click buttons** are used to select items on the screen, double-click and bring up context menus. They work like mouse click buttons. The center click button (below the other buttons) is used to activate the enhanced TrackPoint functions.
- 18 The **Fn key** is used with the function keys (F1–F12) to activate various functions.
- 19 The **TrackPoint** is a built-in pointing device that functions like a mouse. It also has enhanced features that a mouse does not have.
- 2 The **function keys** are used for activating special ThinkPad functions (shown with blue-gray icons).
- 21 The **built-in microphone** is used for sound recording and telephony.
- 22 The **indicator panel** shows the current status of the computer and battery power with indicators and numeric information.
- 23 The **brightness control lever** adjusts the brightness of the screen.

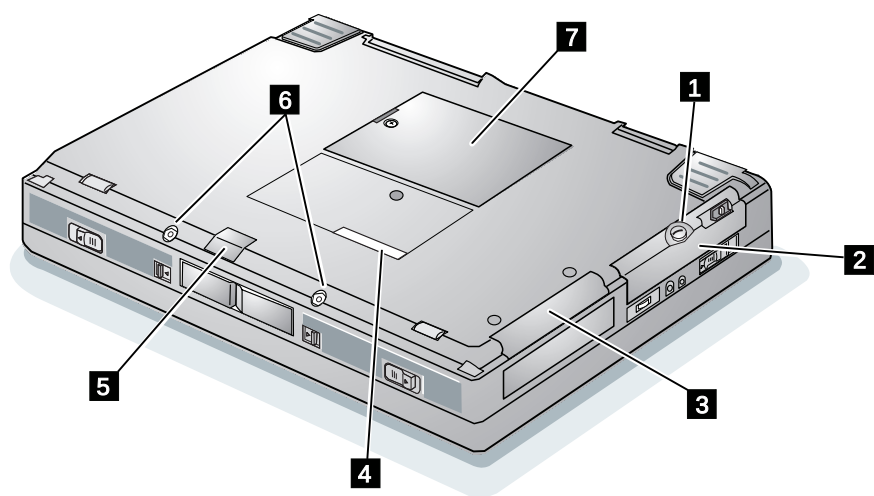


Identifying the Hardware Features

- 1 The **battery pack** is a built-in power source for the computer. It allows you to operate the computer when ac power is not available.
 - 2 The **volume control** adjusts the sound level of the built-in speakers.
 - 3 The **microphone/line-in jack** is where you connect a stereo microphone or external audio device. (1/8-inch stereo mini jack)
 - \$ 4 The **headphone jack** is where you connect a stereo headphone or external speakers. (1/8-inch stereo mini jack)
 - \$ 5 The **power switch** turns the computer on and off.
 - 6 The **reset switch** resets the system in an emergency.
 - 7 The **security keyhole** is used with a security lock. (See "Using Locks" on page 115.)
 - 8 The **ac power jack** is where you connect the AC Adapter cable.
 - 9 The **external-input-device connector** allows you to attach a mouse, an external keyboard, or an external numeric keypad.
 - 1 The **serial connector** (9-pin) is where you connect a serial-device cable.
 - 11 The **universal serial bus (USB) connector** allows you to connect any device that conforms to the USB interface. Many recent digital devices comply to this new standard.
 - 12 The **fan louvers** are for circulating air within the computer. *Do not place any object in front of these louvers.*
 - 13 The **system-expansion connector** (240-pin) allows you to connect the IBM ThinkPad SelectaBase 770 port replicator.
 - 14 The **rear infrared port** allows your computer to communicate with other devices that have infrared data-transfer capabilities.
 - 15 The **external-monitor connector** (15-pin) is where you attach an external monitor (CRT).
 - 16 The **parallel connector** (25-pin) is where you usually connect a parallel-printer signal cable.
 - 17 The **external-diskette-drive connector** is where you attach an external-diskette-drive.
 - 18 The **power-on indicator** indicates that the computer power is on, regardless of whether the computer is in suspend mode.
 - 19 The **suspend indicator** indicates that the computer is in suspend mode.
 - Green:** The computer is in suspend mode.
 - Blinking green:** The computer is in the process of changing modes.
 - 2 The **charge indicator** shows the charge status of your battery.
 - Green:** Enough battery power is left for operation.
 - Orange:** The battery pack is being charged.
 - Blinking orange:** The battery pack needs to be charged.
- You will hear three beeps the moment this indicator starts blinking if you had set the alarm in the ThinkPad Configuration program.

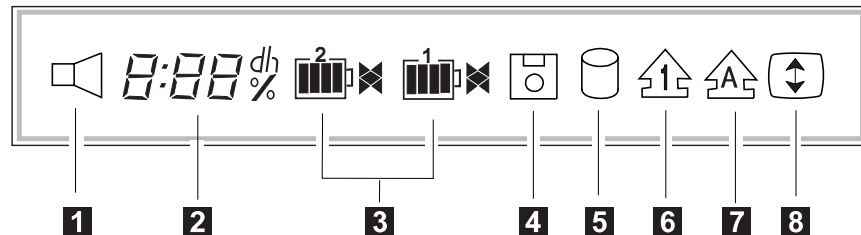


Identifying the Hardware Features

- 1 The **coin screw** can be changed to a security screw shipped with your computer to prevent others from gaining access to the hard disk in the hard disk bay.
- 2 The **hard disk bay** houses the replaceable hard disk drive.
- 3 The **adapter bay** is a slot for installing the *DVD and Enhanced Video Adapter*, an optional feature of your computer.
- 4 The **serial number label** identifies your computer. You might be asked for this if you get support from the help center.
- 5 The **front infrared port** allows your computer to communicate with other devices that have infrared data-transfer capabilities.
- 6 The **security screws** are hex-head screws that can be installed to prevent others from releasing the left and right **release latches** and easily gaining access to the battery bay and the UltraBay II.
- 7 The **bottom compartment** houses the DIMM memory slots and the backup battery slot. You can insert up to two DIMM memory cards into the memory slots to upgrade your system memory. The backup battery in the battery slot is used for retaining computer information in computer memory and also for running the time-of-day clock.

System-Status Indicators

Various indicators appear on the indicator panel. These indicators show the current status of your computer. You can use your computer more efficiently once you know what these indicators mean.



- 1 The **speaker** indicator appears when the speaker beeps. It turns off when a key is pressed.
- 2 The **remaining battery** indicator shows the remaining battery power in either percent (%), days (*d*), hours (*h*), or hours and minutes (*hh:mm*).

When a secondary battery is used, the indicator shows the average percentage of the main battery and the secondary battery combined.
- 3 The **battery status** indicator shows the status of the main battery pack **1** (in the battery bay) and the secondary battery pack **2** (in the UltraBay II) in five levels, from empty  to full .

The indicator on the right shows the battery charge status; charging () and discharging (). A blank indicates no battery activity.
- 4 The **diskette drive in-use** indicator appears when data is being read from or is being written to a diskette.

Do not enter suspend mode or eject the diskette when this indicator is on.
- 5 The **hard disk in-use** indicator appears when data is being read from or is being written to the hard disk.

Do not enter suspend mode or turn off the computer when this indicator is on.

System-Status Indicators

- 6 The **numeric lock** indicator indicates that the numeric keypad function is enabled. Press and hold the **Shift** key while pressing the **NumLk** key to enable or disable this function.
- 7 The **caps lock** indicator indicates that the caps lock mode is enabled. This mode enables you to enter the alphabetic characters (A–Z) in capital letters without using the **Shift** key. The **Caps Lock** key enables and disables this mode.
- 8 The **scroll lock** indicator indicates that the scroll lock function is enabled. This function enables you to use the **Arrow** keys to scroll the screen. However, you will not be able to move the cursor with these keys when this function is enabled. The **ScrLk** key enables and disables this function. Not all application programs support this function.

Keyboard Functions

Your computer's keyboard has the following functions:

- TrackPoint
- Fn** key
- Numeric keypad

TrackPoint

The keyboard contains a unique cursor-pointing device called the *TrackPoint*. Pointing, selecting, and dragging all become part of a single process you can perform without moving your fingers from their typing position.



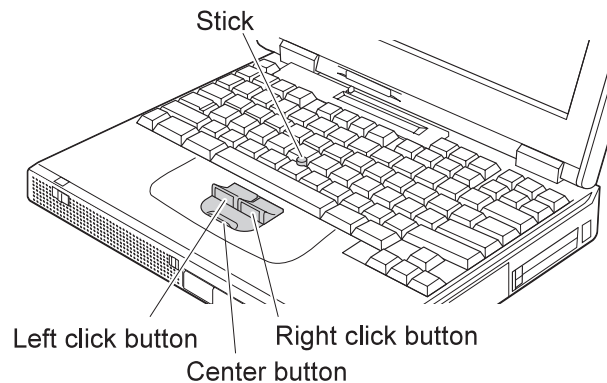
You can set the following features by customizing the TrackPoint:

- Press-to-Select
- Sensitivity
- Scrolling or Magnifying Glass

Functions of Your Computer

The TrackPoint consists of a **stick** on the keyboard and three **click buttons** below the keyboard. Movement of the cursor on the screen is controlled by the amount of pressure that you apply to the nonslip cap on the stick in any direction parallel to the keyboard; the stick itself does *not* move. The speed at which the cursor moves corresponds to the pressure you apply to the stick. The functions of the left and right click buttons correspond to those of the left and right mouse buttons on a traditional mouse; these functions depend on the software you are using. The function of the center button is described on page 52.



If you are not familiar with using the TrackPoint, these instructions will help you get started:

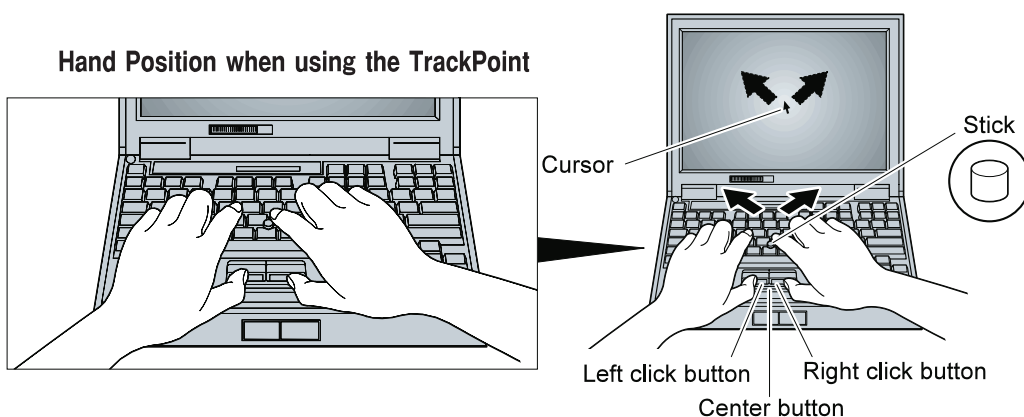
- 1** Place your hands in the typing position and press gently with either index finger on the stick in the direction you want the cursor to move.

Pressing the stick away from you moves the cursor up the screen; pressing it toward you moves the cursor down the screen. You can also move the cursor side to side by pressing sideways.



The cursor might drift. This is not a defect. Do not use the TrackPoint until the cursor stops moving.

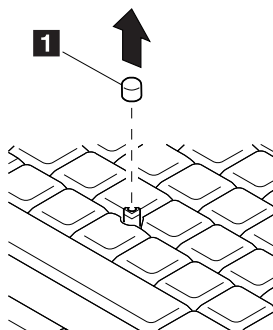
- 2** Press the left and right click buttons with either thumb to select and drag as required by your software.

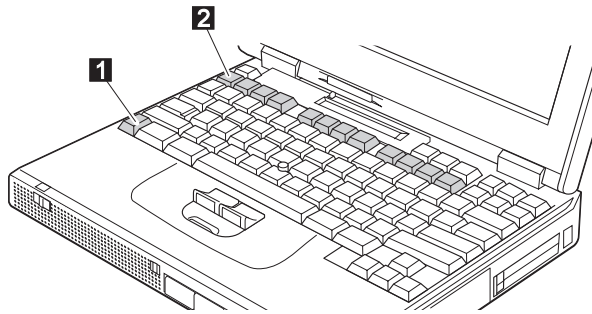

Fn Key

The **Fn** key function allows you to change operational features instantly. When you use the following functions, press and hold the **Fn** key 1 ; then press the appropriate function key 2 (**F1** to **F12**).



The Fn Key Lock Function

The following setup gives you the same effect as when you press and hold the **Fn** key and then press an appropriate function key.

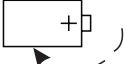
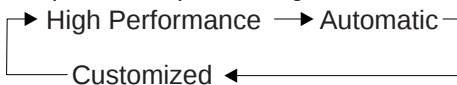
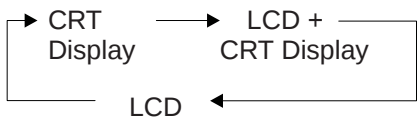
() button, and click on **Enable** for **Fn key lock**. You can also set up by typing `PS2 FNS E` at the command prompt.

After you enable the **Fn** key lock and press **Fn** *once*, press one of the function keys. The computer works the same as when you press **Fn** + the function key.

If you press **Fn** *twice* after enabling the lock, pressing a function key alone is recognized as a combination of **Fn** + that function key. To stop this function, press **Fn** again.

If your computer is equipped with a 13.7-inch SXGA display used in standard VGA mode, such as MS-DOS full screen mode or the safe mode screen of Windows 98 or Windows 95, computer output is displayed in expansion mode. In this case, you cannot switch the LCD screen image size.

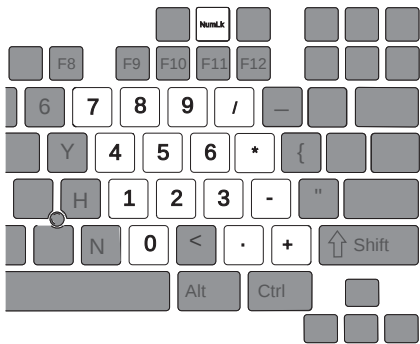
If the computer is in suspend mode and you press the **Fn** key independently without any function key, the computer returns to normal operation.

Numeric Keypad

The keyboard has some keys that, when enabled, work as if they were a 10-key numeric keypad. (The numeric keypad on the keyboard is not active when the external keyboard or the external numeric keypad is attached to the computer.)

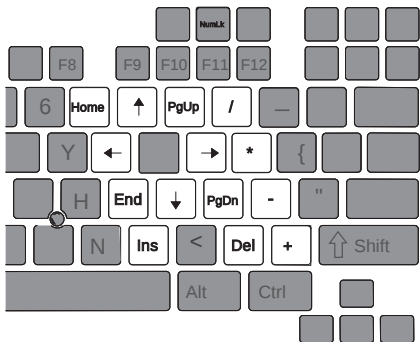
To enable or disable the numeric keypad, press and hold **Shift** and then press **NumLk**.



If the numeric keypad is enabled, press and hold **Shift** to temporarily use the cursor- and screen-control keys.



The functions of the cursor- and screen-control keys are not printed on the keys.



ThinkPad Utility Programs

Your computer has the following utility programs for easy configuration:

Easy-Setup ThinkPad Configuration program

This section summarizes these utility programs.

Easy-Setup

Your computer provides a user-friendly program called *Easy-Setup*, which allows you to select various setup parameters:

Config: Set the configuration of your computer.

Date/Time: Set the date and time.

Password: Set a password.

Start up: Set the startup device.

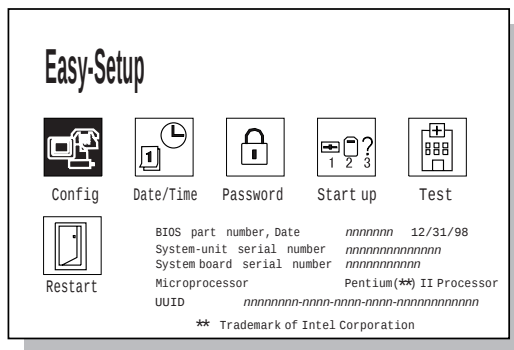
Test: Test the system.

Restart: Restart the system.

To start Easy-Setup, do as follows:

- 1** Power off the computer, and remove any diskette from the diskette drive.
- 2** Press and hold **F1**; then power on the computer. Hold **F1** until the “Easy-Setup” menu appears.

If you have set a password, the “Easy-Setup” menu appears after you enter the password.



Functions of Your Computer

- 3 Move to an icon you want to change, using the arrow keys or the TrackPoint, and click on the icon.

A submenu is displayed.

- 4 Change the items you wish to change.

- 5 Click on **Exit** to exit from the submenu.

- 6 Click on **Restart** to exit from the “Easy-Setup” menu.

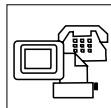

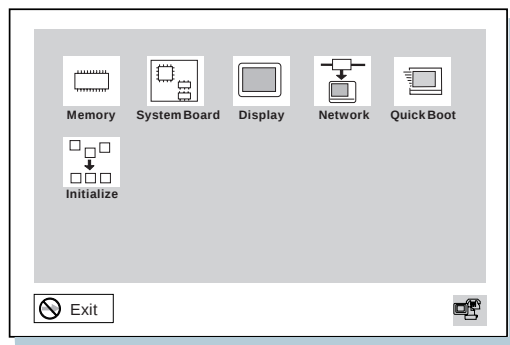
You can change the color of the “Easy-Setup” menu by pressing the **Ctrl+PgUp** keys or by pressing the **Ctrl+PgDn** keys.

Clicking on the **Config** button displays the following “Config” submenu:



The **Memory** button shows the amount of memory installed and available.



The **System Board** button provides information on the system board installed.

The **Display** button sets the screen output to be displayed on either a **single** screen or on **multiple** screens.



The **Network** button enables or disables the Wake-on-LAN function (option) or the Flash-over-LAN function (option). You can use these functions only with a docking station.



The **Quick Boot** button enables or disables the Simple Boot Flag function.



Simple Boot Flag function

This function automatically optimizes the behavior and boot performance of the BIOS and operating system, based on the installed operating system and previous boot.

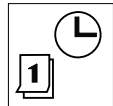
If this function is **Enabled** and once a Plug and Play-capable operating system, such as Windows 98, is installed, the system BIOS does not configure such hardware resources as system interruptions, memory windows, and I/O port ranges for all the devices in the system.

If you are going to use a non-Plug and Play-capable operating system, disable this function so that the BIOS will configure hardware resources.



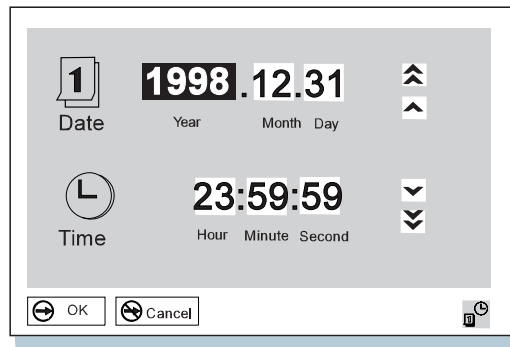
The **Initialize** button sets all device settings to their default values.

Date/Time

Clicking on the **Date/Time** button displays the following “Date and Time” submenu, which you can use to set the current date and time:



To change the date and time, do the following:

- 1** Move the cursor to any field (Year, Month, Day, Hour, Minute, Second); then type the date and time.



Instead of typing, you can place the pointer on any of the arrow icons (▲, ▴, ▼, or ▾) to adjust the date and time. Clicking on the double-arrow icon scrolls the numbers faster.

- 2** Click on **OK** to save the changes or on **Cancel** to cancel them.



You can also set the current date and time with the application included with the operating system installed in your computer.

Password

Clicking on the **Password** button displays the “Password” submenu, which you can use to set passwords:

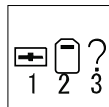

Start up

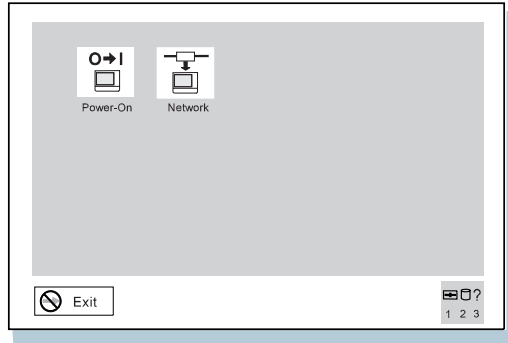
To change the startup sequence, do the following:

- 1** Click on **Start up** in the “Easy-Setup” menu. The “Startup” submenu appears:

You must be extremely careful not to specify a wrong device during a copy, save, or a format operation after you change your startup sequence. If you specify a wrong device, your data and programs might be erased or overwritten.

The **Power-On** button sets the startup sequence when the power switch is set to ON.

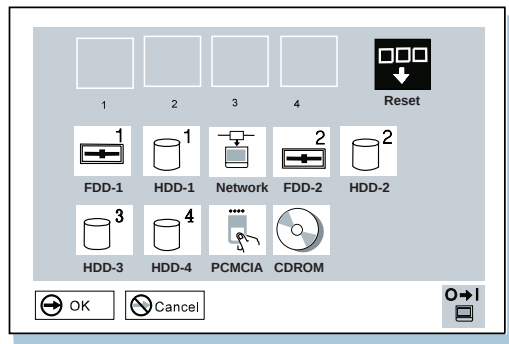


The **Network** button sets the startup sequence when Wake on LAN is started. Wake on LAN is typically used by LAN administrators in corporate networks to access your computer remotely. This function can be used only with a docking station (option).

- 2** Click on **Power-On** or **Network**.
- 3** Move the cursor to the **Reset** icon, and click on it.
- 4** Select the first device you want for the startup sequence, then click on it.
You can set up to four devices.
- 5** Click on **OK** or press **Enter** to save the changes.

Functions of Your Computer

The **Power-On** submenu:



The **FDD-1** icon is the diskette drive in the UltraBay II. If you don't have a diskette drive in the UltraBay II but you have one in the docking station, that diskette drive becomes **FDD-1**. If you have an additional diskette drive, that drive becomes **FDD-2**.

The following table shows the diskette drives that correspond to FDD-1 or FDD-2:

Note: The external diskette drive, connecting both the computer and the port replicator, and the diskette drive in the docking station use a common port. You cannot use more than two diskette drives among the three locations at the same time. You can use the diskette drive in the UltraBay II without any restriction, because the port is independent.

Functions of Your Computer

The **HDD-1** to **HDD-4** icons are assigned to each hard disk drive in the following priority:

1. The primary hard disk drive (placed in the hard disk bay of the computer)
2. A hard disk drive in the UltraBay II
3. A hard disk drive in the UltraBay II tray of the docking station
4. A hard disk drive in the device space of the docking station
5. A hard disk drive connected to the computer with a SCSI connector

For example, if you don't have the hard disk drive in the computer's UltraBay II but you have one in the docking station, that hard disk drive becomes **HDD-2**.

If you are using a *remote program loading (RPL) system* through a token-ring card or some other network card, do the following:

1. Select **Network** and click on it. The "Speed" menu appears.
2. If you are using a token-ring card, select the speed you want (**4** or **16**), and click on it; then press **Enter**.

If you are using a network card other than a token-ring card, such as an Ethernet card, you need not specify the RPL speed. Press **Esc** to exit this menu.

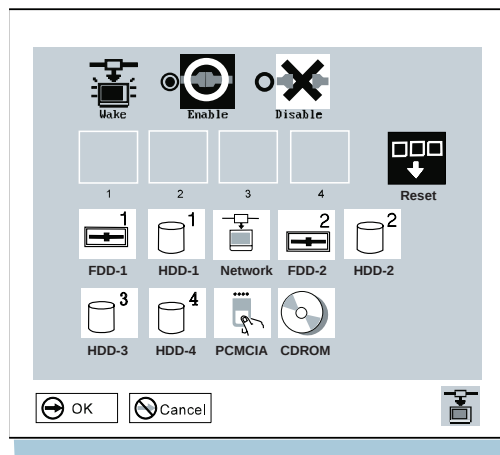
If you select **PCMCIA**, representing, for example, ATA-3 HDD or a Flash memory card, and cannot start the system, disable the secondary IDE device and restart the system. Some cards might not be compatible with a CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive.

The **CDROM** icon is assigned to the CD-ROM drive in the UltraBay II. If you don't have a CD-ROM drive in the UltraBay II but you have one in the docking station, that CD-ROM drive becomes **CDROM**. If you have CD-ROM drives in both the UltraBay II and the docking station, the CD-ROM drive in the UltraBay II becomes **CDROM**.

Functions of Your Computer

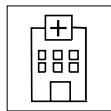
The **Network** submenu:

(This function can be used only with a docking station option.
You can enable or disable the Wake-on-LAN function.)



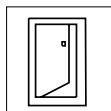
If Wake on LAN is enabled, the network administrator can power on remote machines connected in a LAN using remote network-management software. Disable the function if your computer is not under system management of a network administrator.

Test

Pressing the **Test** button displays the “Test” submenu. It is used to run diagnostic tests on your computer to check for hardware errors.

Restart

Pressing the **Restart** button ends the Easy-Setup program and restarts the computer.

Functions of Your Computer

ThinkPad Configuration Program



To get specific details about ThinkPad Configuration program, click on the Help button.

The ThinkPad Configuration program allows you to set up and customize the computer's built-in devices to your needs. For example, you can enable or disable a port, switch between your computer's LCD and an external monitor, and set the power management mode.

This section describes how to start the ThinkPad Configuration program.



For Windows 98:

To start the ThinkPad Configuration program for Windows 98, do as follows:

1. Click on **Start** ().
2. Move the cursor to **Settings**; then click on **Control Panel**.
The "Control Panel" window appears.
3. Double-click on the **ThinkPad Configuration** icon.



You can also start the ThinkPad Configuration program as follows:

Click on **Start** (), move the cursor to **Programs**, and **ThinkPad**; then click on **ThinkPad Configuration**.

Find the ThinkPad icon on the bottom right of the taskbar 1 ; then double-click on the icon.

The following window appears:



- 1 The **Display Device** buttons. Click on one of these buttons to set the display output type to the LCD, external monitor (CRT), or both.
- 2 The **Power Scheme** buttons change the preset power options.
- 3 The **Launch Device Manager** button displays the “System Properties” window, where you can make a device available or unavailable.
- 4 The **Show Allocated Resources View** button displays the “Allocated Resources View” window, where you can check the memory addresses and other allocation settings.
- 5 The **Help** button displays online help.
- 6 The **Device** buttons. Click on the button of your choice from the window. If the device is enabled, the red indicator next to the button is lit. Otherwise, it stays off.

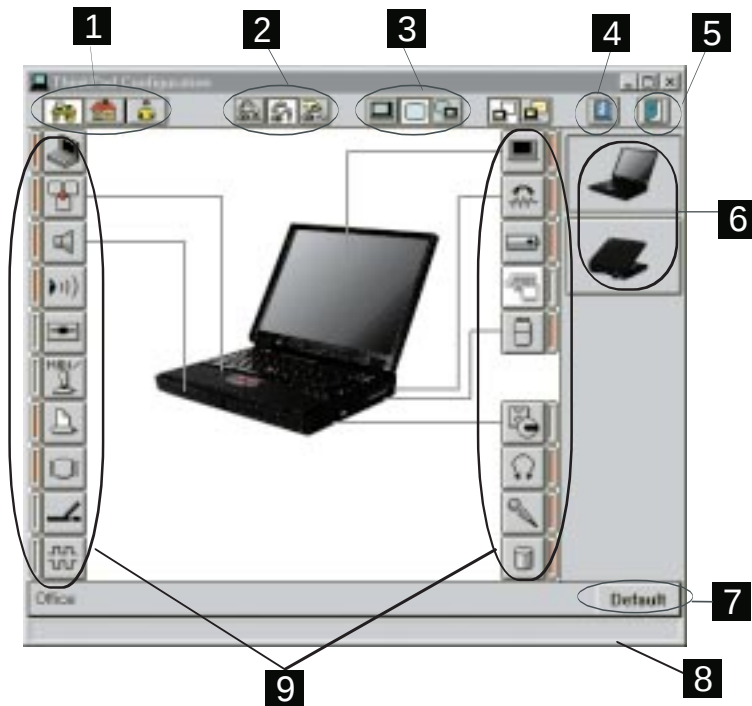


For Windows NT:

To start the ThinkPad Configuration program for Windows NT, do as follows:

- 1** Click on **Start** at the bottom corner of the screen.

- 1** The **One-Touch Setup** buttons. Click on one of these buttons to set the system configuration.
- 2** The **Power Mode** buttons. Click on one of these buttons to set the power mode to High Performance mode, Automatic mode, or Customized mode.

- 3 The **Display Device** buttons. Click on one of these buttons to set the display output type to the LCD, external monitor (CRT), or both. When making a presentation, you can click on the presentation button to disable any system timers, such as the LCD turnoff timer or the power management mode timers.
- 4 The **Help** button displays online help.
- 5 The **Exit** button. Click on this button to save the changes made and to exit from the ThinkPad Configuration window.
- 6 The **View Angle** buttons. Click on the front view or rear view button to display the hardware feature locations.

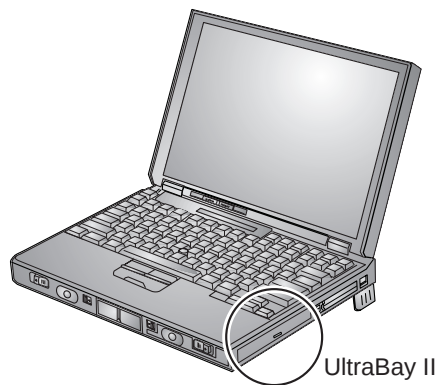

The Recovery CD package consists of a startable diskette and a CD-ROM containing the original preinstalled image.

The recovery process might take up to 2 hours.

If you have a CD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM drive installed in your computer's UltraBay II and you don't have an external diskette drive attached, go to "Case 1" on page 34.

If you have a CD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM drive installed in your computer's UltraBay II and you do have an external diskette drive attached, go to "Case 2" on page 35.

If you have a diskette drive installed in your computer's UltraBay II, replace it with the CD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM drive (see "Replacing an UltraBay II Device" on page 90). Then go to "Case 1" on page 34.

The recovery program on the boot diskette includes drivers to support many devices such as the external CD-ROM drive, docking station, and hard disk drive. Choose an appropriate option. You are prompted if user intervention is required.

- 6** When a completion message appears, remove the Recovery CD Boot diskette from the diskette drive.

7 Press **Restart**.

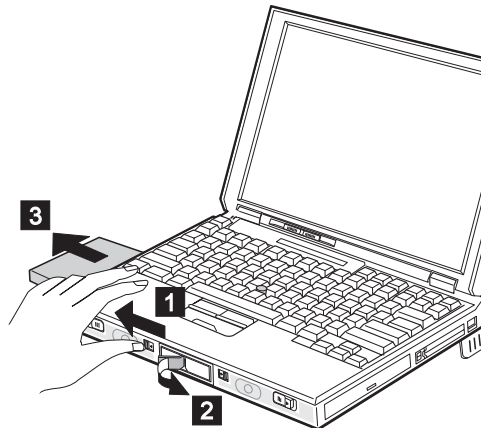

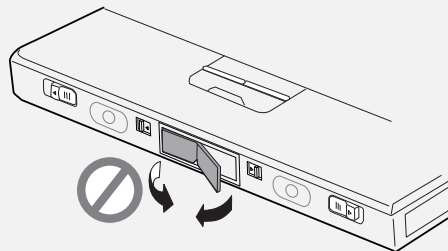
Replacing the Battery Pack

To replace the battery pack, do as follows:

- 1** Power off your computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Slide the left release latch to the left **1** and gently lift up the bay eject lever **2** and pull out the battery pack **3**.



You can use only one eject lever at a time. When opening an eject lever, make sure that the other eject lever is closed.



Replacing the Battery Pack

- 3** Insert the new battery pack until it snaps into place.

Make sure you **align the slanted edge** of the battery pack with the slant on the battery bay.

- 4** Push in the bay eject lever until it is flush.

You have finished replacing the battery pack.



NOTE

You can replace the battery when the computer is in hibernation mode or when it is powered off. If you are using a PC Card, the computer might not be able to enter hibernation mode. If this happens, power off the computer.

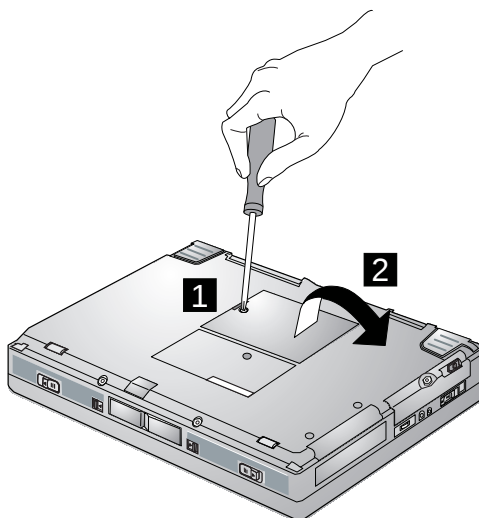

This section explains how to replace the backup 3-volts lithium battery (CR2025) in the bottom compartment.

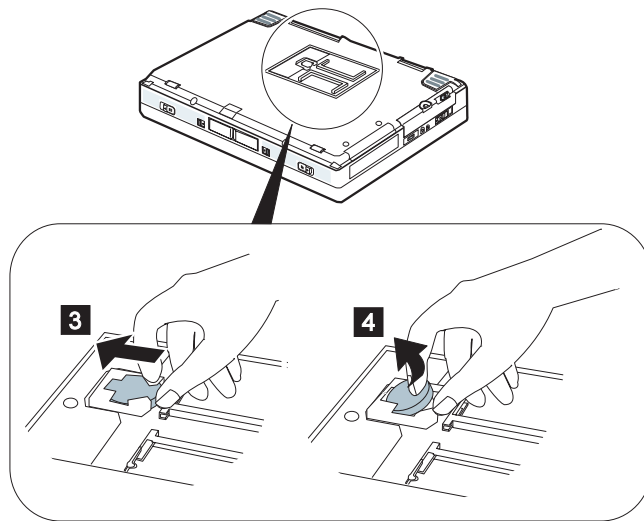


- 1** Power off the computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Turn the computer over.
- 3** Open the bottom compartment with a screwdriver **1** and remove the bottom cover **2**.



Replacing the Battery Pack

- 4** Find the old backup battery in the bottom compartment and remove it from the battery holder by pushing it in **3** ; then the one side of the battery pops up **4** .



Remove the battery after it pops up from the battery holder. Forcing the battery out will damage the holder.

- 5** Install a new backup battery facing up the side on which plus mark (+) is shown.
- 6** Replace the bottom cover, and turn the computer over again.
- 7** Connect the AC Adapter to the computer.
You have finished replacing the backup battery.

Extending the Features of Your Computer

This chapter provides information about how to customize and extend the ThinkPad features. You can use your computer with external devices and increase its memory.

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Customizing the TrackPoint

You can customize the TrackPoint by doing the following:

- 1** Open the ThinkPad Configuration program.
- 2** Click on the **TrackPoint** button ().
- 3** Click on **TrackPoint Properties...**

The “TrackPoint Properties” window appears:

You can set the following features in this window:

Press-to-Select
Sensitivity
Scrolling or Magnifying Glass

Setting Press-to-Select



If you enable Press-to-Select by putting a check mark in the **Enable Press-to-Select** box, you can make the TrackPoint stick function the same as the left or right click button.

If you check **Enable dragging**, you can drag the icon that you select with the TrackPoint stick by putting light pressure on the stick.

Customizing the TrackPoint

If you check **Enable Release-to-Select**, you can click simply by lifting your finger quickly off the TrackPoint. Moving the cursor onto an icon and then lifting your finger off the TrackPoint works like clicking. Pressing the TrackPoint again works like double-clicking.

Click on one of the **Press means** radio buttons to select which button the stick will simulate: either the left or the right button. For example, if you select **Left Click**, you can start a program with the TrackPoint by putting the cursor on the program's icon and applying light pressure on the stick.

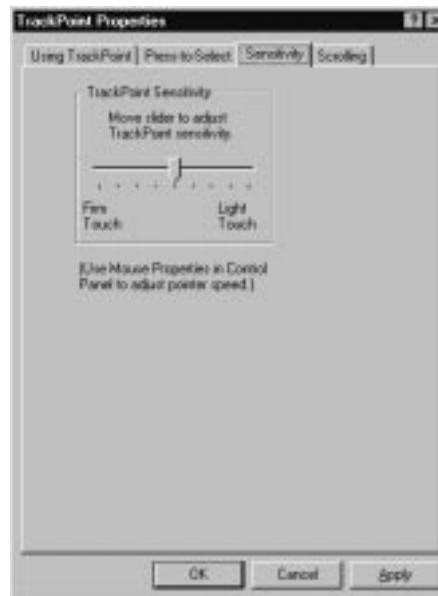
To adjust the pressing timing of the stick, set **Click Pace**.



If you set the pace too slow, you might notice unintended clicks, a cursor delay, or a dragging delay. However, if you set the pace too fast, you might find Press-to-Select hard to use.

Customizing the TrackPoint

Setting Sensitivity



This function adjusts the force required for both cursor movement and Press-to-Select. Slide toward **Firm Touch** to increase the force needed to move the cursor and to activate Press-to-Select. Slide toward **Light Touch** to decrease the force needed to move the cursor and to activate Press-to-Select.

Customizing the TrackPoint

Setting Scrolling or Magnifying Glass



By clicking on the **Scrolling** tab, you can set the scrolling properties of your TrackPoint.

Choose Scrolling or the Magnifying Glass Function

Select one of the following radio buttons:

- **Scrolling**
This function enables you to navigate easily through long documents or large spreadsheets with the press of a button. To scroll, press the center click button and then use the TrackPoint instead of the scroll bars.
- **Magnifying Glass**
This function enables you to enlarge a movable area of your display. You can click on objects “through” the magnifying glass. The right click button changes the size of the magnifying glass, and the left click button changes its magnifying power. You can press the center click button and then use the TrackPoint to move the magnified area.

Customizing the TrackPoint

- **Neither**

This function disables the scrolling and magnifying glass functions.

Choose Scrolling Method

Select one of the following radio buttons:

- **Press Center Button, then use TrackPoint**

This option enables you to hold down the center click button and then use the TrackPoint to control the scrolling or the magnifying glass. When you are not holding down the center button, the TrackPoint operates normally; that is, it controls the mouse cursor.

- **Use External Mouse**

This option sets an externally attached mouse to scroll (or move the magnifying glass) horizontally or vertically. The TrackPoint functions simply as a cursor.

- **Use TrackPoint**

This option sets the TrackPoint to scroll horizontally or vertically without your holding down the center button. Use an externally attached mouse as a cursor.

You can still use the TrackPoint to control the mouse cursor by pressing the center button.

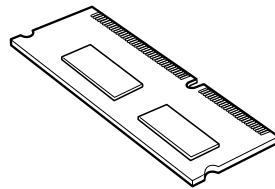


NOTE

The **Use External Mouse** and the **Use TrackPoint** radio buttons are enabled only if a mouse is attached.

Increasing Memory

Increasing memory capacity is an effective way to make programs run faster. You can increase the amount of memory in your computer by installing a *dual inline memory module (DIMM)*, available as an option.



Different capacities of DIMMs are available. You can install a DIMM directly in one of the memory slots on the bottom of the computer. Your computer memory capacity can be expanded up to 320 MB (64-MB base memory and two 128-MB DIMM options). If your computer is equipped with 128-MB base memory, install two 128-MB DIMM options after removing the 64-MB DIMM option that had been installed at the time of purchase.



The ThinkPad 770X computer supports the synchronus dynamic random access memory (SDRAM) card only. It does not support the enhanced data output dynamic random access memory (EDO DRAM) card. If you install a DIMM that is not supported by your computer, a 225 error code might appear when the system starts. The appropriate memory option can be purchased through your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative.

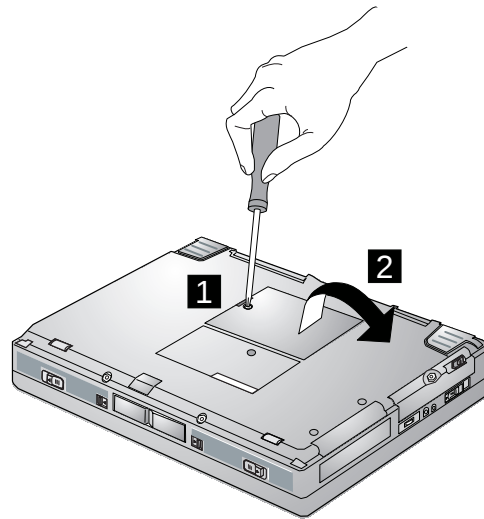
Installing the DIMM

To install the DIMM, do the following:

- 1** Power off the computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Remove the battery pack.
- 3** Close the LCD, and turn the computer over.
- 4** Loosen the screw on the memory slot cover **1** ; then remove the cover **2** .



To avoid damaging the DIMM, do not touch its contact edge.



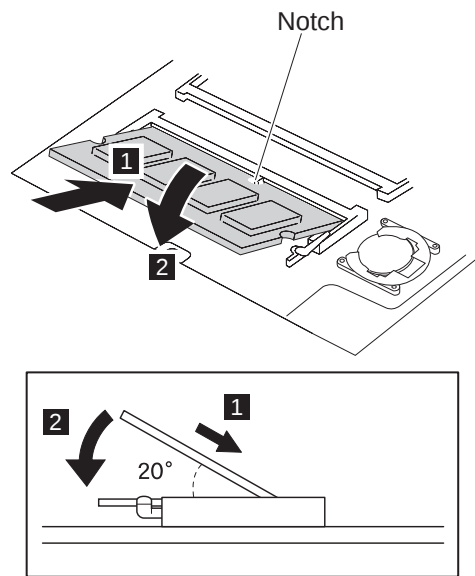
- 5** Find the notch on the side of the DIMM.

Increasing Memory

6 With the notched end of the DIMM toward the right side of the socket, insert the DIMM, at an angle of approximately 20°, into the socket; then press it firmly **1** .

7 Pivot the DIMM until it snaps into place **2** .

If you want to install two DIMMs, repeat steps 5 through 7.



8 Replace the memory slot cover over the memory slot, aligning the back side of the cover first as shown; then tighten the screw.

9 Turn the computer over again.

10 Replace the battery pack and power on the computer.

11 Confirm that the new memory size appears at the upper left corner of the screen.

Increasing Memory

For example, if you install a 32-MB DIMM to 64-MB base memory model into your computer, you should see the following. (See the next page for how to calculate the total memory size.)

```
97728 KB OK
```

You have finished installing the DIMM. Reconnect all cables.



NOTE

1. For the following status, power off the computer and reinstall the DIMM and do the memory test with Easy-Setup (see “Testing Your Computer” on page 164).

If a 2 1 error code appears under the memory count.

```
48576 KB OK
2 1
```

If the total memory size is not the same as the value you calculated.

If the 225 error code appears, the memory you are installing is not supported by your computer.

2. If you changed the memory installed in the computer, you need to create a new hibernation file as follows:
 - a) Power off the computer.
 - b) Remove the DIMM you added.
 - c) Power on the computer and disable hibernation mode.
 - d) Add the DIMM.
 - e) Enable hibernation mode.

To disable and enable hibernation mode → “Basic” in the *Online User's Guide*.

Increasing Memory



How to Calculate Total Memory Size

Calculate your total memory size in kilobytes (KB) by adding the DIMM memory size to the base memory size (32192 KB).

For example, if you installed a 32-MB DIMM into your computer with 64-MB base memory, you should have about 96 MB.

Your computer might display memory size in kilobytes. For example, 96 MB=97728 KB.

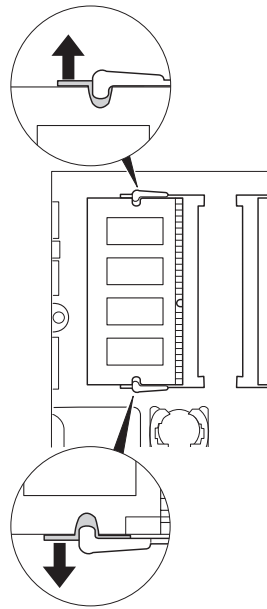
Note: 576 KB is reserved by the system.

Removing the DIMM

- 1** Power off the computer and disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Remove the battery pack.
- 3** Close the LCD, and turn the computer over.
- 4** Loosen the screw and remove the memory slot cover.

Increasing Memory

- 5** Press out on the latches on both edges of the socket at the same time.



- 6** Remove the DIMM.
Be sure to save the DIMM for future use.
- 7** Replace the memory slot cover; then tighten the screw.
- 8** Turn the computer over again.
- 9** Replace the battery pack; then connect the AC Adapter and all the cables you disconnected.

Upgrading the Hard Disk Drive

You can increase the storage capacity of your computer by replacing the original, built-in hard disk drive with an optional one. You can purchase the option from your IBM reseller or IBM marketing representative.



NOTE

Replace the hard disk drive only if you upgrade it or have it repaired. **You should not replace it often.**



ATTENTION

Handling a Hard Disk Drive

- Do not drop or apply any shock.**
- Do not apply pressure to the cover.**
- Do not touch the connector.**

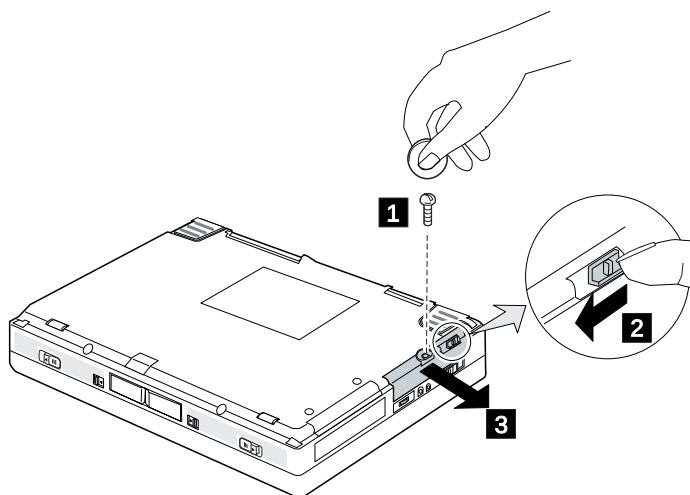
The drive is very sensitive. Incorrect handling can cause damage and permanent loss of data on the hard disk. Before removing the hard disk drive, make a backup copy of all the information on the hard disk. Never remove the drive while the system is operating, in suspend mode, or in hibernation mode.

To replace the hard disk drive, do the following:

- 1** Power off the computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Remove the battery pack (➡ “Replacing the Battery Pack” on page 38), and turn the computer over.

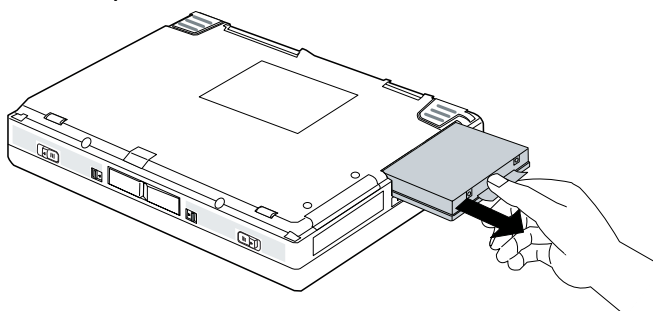
Upgrading the Hard Disk Drive

- 3** Remove the coin screw by rotating it counterclockwise with a coin, as shown **1**, slide the latch **2**; then remove the hard disk drive cover **3**.



You can replace the coin screw with the security screw shipped with your computer. With the security screw installed, the hard disk drive in your computer cannot be removed easily. To remove or tighten the security screw, use a 2.5-mm allen wrench.

- 4** Pull the strap of the hard disk drive to remove it.



Upgrading the Hard Disk Drive

- 5** Insert the new hard disk drive into the bay. Make sure you connect the drive firmly.



Do not use force when inserting the hard disk drive into the bay. The connector is sensitive, and it might get damaged.

- 6** Replace the hard disk drive cover; then reinstall the screw, and turn the computer over again.

- 7** Replace the battery pack, and power it on.



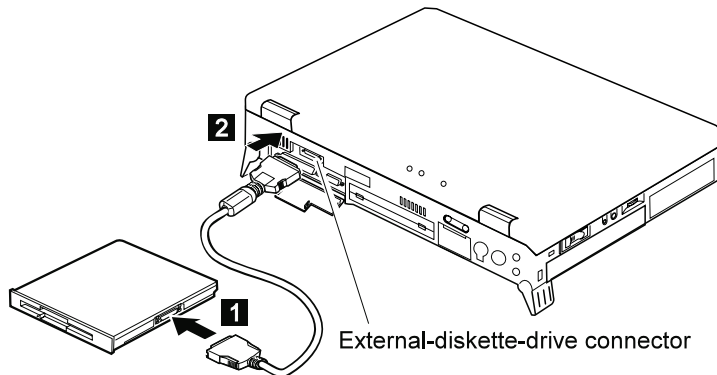
After removing the original hard disk drive, store it in the carrying case that contained the replacement drive.

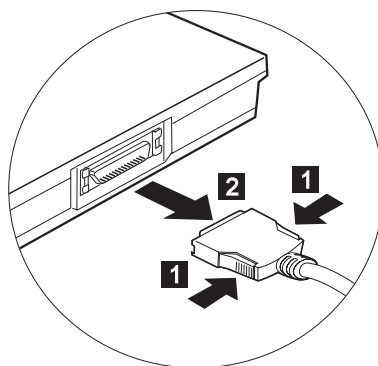
You can connect your external diskette drive to the external-diskette-drive connector. To attach it, do as follows:

- 2** Open the connector cover on the rear side of the computer.
- 3** Attach the cable first to the external diskette drive **1** ; then attach it to the external-diskette-drive connector on the computer **2** .

To detach the external diskette drive, push the connector lock on both sides 1 ; then disconnect the cable from the connector 2 .



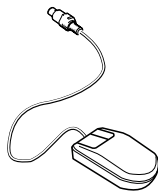

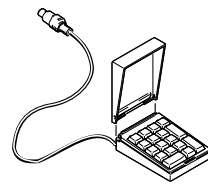

Attaching an External Mouse or Numeric Keypad

You can attach an external mouse or numeric keypad to the external-input-device connector () on the rear of the computer.

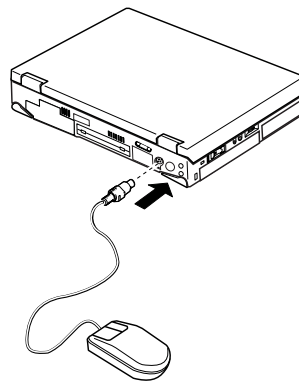


Mouse

If you want to attach the mouse, attach it directly to the external-input-device connector as shown:

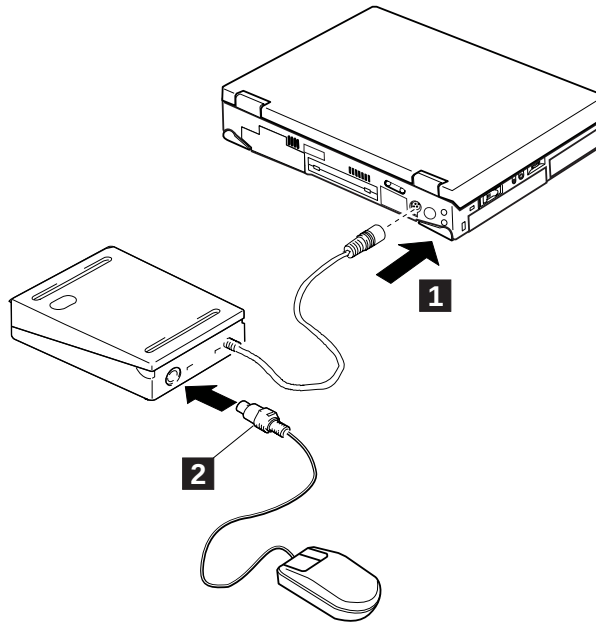

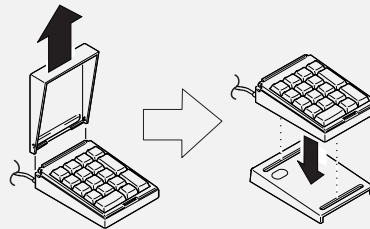


You can use both the IBM PS/2 Miniature Mouse and the TrackPoint as an input device. To connect a mouse other than an IBM PS/2 Miniature Mouse → “Disabling the TrackPoint” on page 69.

If you want to use both the external numeric keypad and mouse at the same time, first connect the keypad cable to the computer 1 ; then connect the mouse cable 2 to the connector at the rear of the keypad.



You can remove the keypad cover and use it as a stand for the keypad.

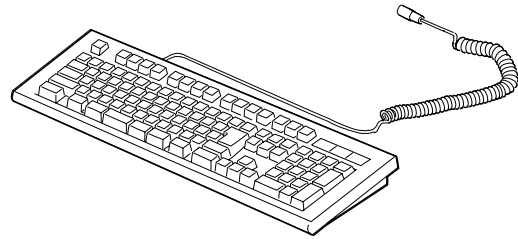

If you want to attach an external keyboard to your computer, do the one of the following:

- Use the optional keyboard/mouse cable.
- Use an optional port replicator.

The external keyboard will not work if it is connected directly to the computer's external-input-device connector.

See the *Options by IBM Catalog* supplied with your computer for details about the options.

When the external keyboard is attached, the following keys are not available:

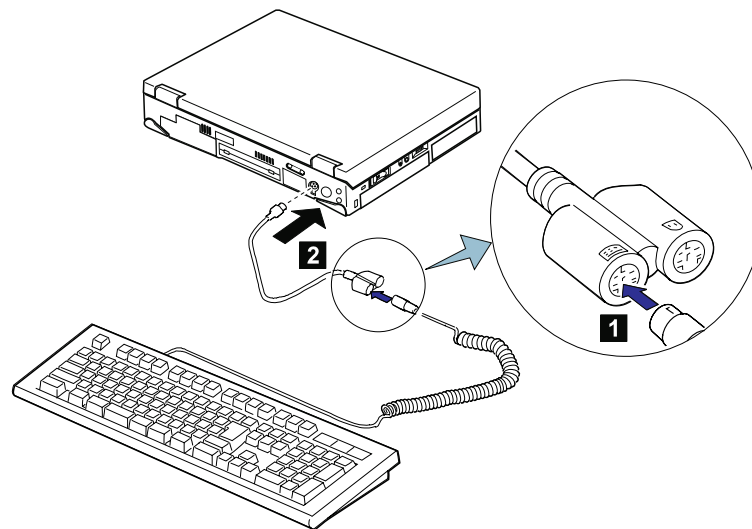
- Numeric keypad on the computer keyboard
- External numeric keypad

Instead, use the numeric keypad on the external keyboard.

Attaching External Mouse, Keypad, and Keyboard

To attach the external keyboard, power off the computer, attach the keyboard to the keyboard connector of the keyboard/mouse cable **1** , and then attach the keyboard/mouse cable to the computer **2** .

You can attach a mouse to the mouse connector of the keyboard/mouse cable.



Using the IBM ThinkPad Space Saver Keyboard

If you are using the IBM ThinkPad Space Saver Keyboard, **do not** install the device driver supplied with the keyboard. The device driver on the computer's utility diskette automatically enables or disables the TrackPoint when the power to the computer is turned on.

Disabling the TrackPoint

The TrackPoint is designed to work simultaneously with another pointing device (such as a mouse) attached to the system. But some mouse types require the TrackPoint to be disabled before you can use them, such as:

- A mouse that is not fully compatible with the PS/2 mouse connected to the external-input-device connector
- A mouse connected to the serial connector
- A mouse connected to the USB connector

To disable the TrackPoint:

1 Start the ThinkPad Configuration program.

See “ThinkPad Configuration Program” on page 26.

2 Click on the **TrackPoint** () button.

3 Click on **Auto-Disable** for the TrackPoint.

This setting automatically disables the TrackPoint if a mouse is connected to the external-input-device connector when the computer starts. If no external mouse is connected, however, the TrackPoint is enabled. Therefore, to reenabling the TrackPoint if it has been disabled, restart the computer after disconnecting a mouse.



If you use a mouse connected to the serial connector or the USB connector, you need to select **Disable**, instead of **Auto-Disable**.

Attaching an External Monitor

This section provides information about using the computer LCD and an external monitor (CRT). It also provides considerations when using DOS applications.

The LCD of your computer uses thin-film transistor (*TFT*) technology. The LCD displays output with XGA (1024x768) or SXGA (1280x1024) resolution video mode and 16M colors.

If you are attaching an external monitor (CRT) that supports a resolution higher than VGA mode, you can achieve a maximum of 1600x1200 video resolution.

To attach an external monitor, do the following:

- 1** Power off the computer.
- 2** Connect the external monitor to the external-monitor connector () at the rear of the computer; then connect the monitor to an electrical outlet.
- 3** Power on the monitor and the computer.
- 4** Start the ThinkPad Configuration program.
See "ThinkPad Configuration Program" on page 26.
- 5** Change the display output location by clicking on the **Both LCD and CRT Display** () button or the **CRT Display Only** () button (with Windows 98, at the *top left* of the screen; with Windows NT, a little to the *right of the top center* of the screen).

Attaching an External Monitor



Do not change the display output location when your computer is doing any of the following:

- Playing or recording audio
- Playing a movie
- Playing a game
- Running any other multimedia application

Stop these applications before changing the display output location.

If you are attaching an external monitor that does not support TFT resolution with TFT frame rate, do **not** click on **Both LCD and CRT Display**. Doing so would cause the external monitor screen to be scrambled and output also not to be displayed; in addition, the screen might become damaged. Use **CRT Display Only** instead.



You can also change the display output location by pressing **Fn+F7**.

6 Set your monitor type and display device driver as follows.

- Click on the **Start**.
- Move the cursor to **Settings** and **Control Panel**; and then click on **Control Panel**.
- Double-click on **Display**.
- Select the **Settings** tab.

g) Click on the **Change...** button.

The "Update Device Driver Wizard" window appears. Follow the instructions on the screen to select your monitor type from the monitor list, and click on a new resolution, color depth and refresh rate.

7 Restart the computer to make the changes effective.



Do not disconnect the external monitor while the computer is in suspend mode or hibernation mode. If no external monitor is attached when the computer resumes, the LCD remains blank and output is not displayed. This restriction does not depend on the resolution value.

Resolutions, Color Depths, and Frame Rates: The following tables show the resolutions, color depths, and frame rates available with your computer or external monitor. Use these tables to set the display output (**LCD Only**, **CRT Display Only**, or **Both LCD and CRT Display**).

Using the Dual Display Function

Windows 98 supports a function named *Multiple Display Support* and your computer supports a function called *Dual Display* in the Windows 98 environment. This function allows the Windows 98 desktop to display output on the LCD-CRT display pair or (if your computer has a video-out connector) LCD-TV display pair. You can display the different desktop images on each monitor.



Attaching a television to your computer:

To attach a television (NTSC or PAL), you need to install a DVD and Enhanced Video Adapter (option) to your computer. For more information → IBM option manual.

To enable the dual display, do as follows:



If you attach the computer to a television, follow the instructions to enable it before doing the following → “Enabling the Multi-Display Function on a Television” on page 75.

- 1** Attach an external monitor (CRT) to your computer.
- 2** Click on **Start**.
- 3** Move the cursor to **Settings** and **Control Panel**; and then click on **Control Panel**.
- 4** Double-click on **Display**.
- 5** Select the **Settings** tab.
- 6** Click on the **Monitor-2** icon in the window.
The “Monitor #2” window appears.
- 7** Click on **Yes** to enable the monitor-2.



You can select the color depths and resolutions for each monitors.

- 8** Click on the **Monitor-1** icon (for the secondary display, the CRT or TV).

Attaching an External Monitor

- 9** Select the color depth and the resolution of the secondary display.
- 10** Click on the **Monitor-2** icon (for the primary display, the LCD).
- 11** Select the color depth and resolution of the primary display.
- 12** Set the relative position of the each monitor by dragging its icon.



You can set the monitors in any relative position, but the icons must touch each other.

- 13** Click on **OK** to apply the changes.

- 1** Attach a television (NTSC or PAL) to the video-out connector of your computer.
- 2** Click on **Start**.
- 3** Move the cursor to **Settings** and **Control Panel**; and then click on **Control Panel**.
- 4** Double-click on **Display**.
- 5** Select the **Settings** tab.
- 6** Double-click on the **Monitor-1** icon in the window.
- 7** Click on the **Display Device** tab.
- 8** Select either NTSC or PAL from the “TV Standard” field.
- 9** Click on the **LCD+TV** button.
- 10** Click on **OK** to apply changes.

Attaching an External Monitor

11 Click on **OK** to close the window.

After you enable the multi-display function on a television, follow the instructions for enabling the dual display function on page 74.

How to Disabling the Dual Display

- 1** Click on **Start**
- 2** Move the cursor to **Settings** and **Control Panel**; and then click on **Control Panel**.
- 3** Double-click on **Display**.
- 4** Select the **Settings** tab.
- 5** Click on the **Monitor-2** icon.
- 6** Remove the check mark from the **Extend my Windows desktop onto this monitor** check box.

The secondary monitor (monitor-2) is disabled, and the settings are in the ready-to-use condition.

Considerations

The primary display is either a CRT or a television and the secondary display is the LCD of your computer.

You cannot set dual display if you specify the LCD to a 1280x1024 resolution and 16M colors for color depth.

The followings are the settings that you are *not* supported:.

LCD	CRT or TV
1024x768, 16M	1280x1024,256 or 64K Any resolution, 16M
1280x1024, 256	1024x768, 16K
1280x1024, 16M	1280x1024, 64K Any resolution, 16M

You need to enable the television setting every time you start your computer to use this function with the television.

Attaching an External Monitor

If you want to show DOS full screen, only primary CRT or TV becomes DOS full screen modes, secondary (LCD) becomes blank.

If you play the video clip (AVI or MPEG file) on the CRT or TV, the image is in overlay mode. On the other hand, on the LCD, the playback will be a software drawing.

An application using the DirectDraw or the Direct3D is shown only on the primary display (LCD) when it is played with full screen mode.

You cannot use the **Fn+F7** (display switching) function and **Fn+F8** (screen expansion) when you are in the dual display mode.

DVD movie cannot be played back if you use the dual display function. To playback it, disable the function before playing back a DVD movie.

Disable the dual display function before you disconnect a CRT or a television.

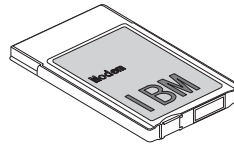

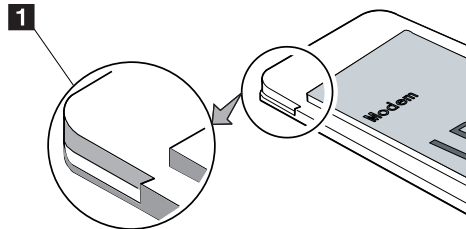
ATTENTION

Do not insert a PC Card while the computer is in suspend mode or hibernation mode. Otherwise, the system might hang.

Your computer has two PC Card slots (upper slot and lower slot) and supports the following types of cards:

PC Card (Type I, Type II, and Type III)
CardBus Card
Zoomed Video (ZV)

1 Find the notched edge 1 of the PC Card as shown.



2 Insert the PC Card into the appropriate slot according to your PC Card type.

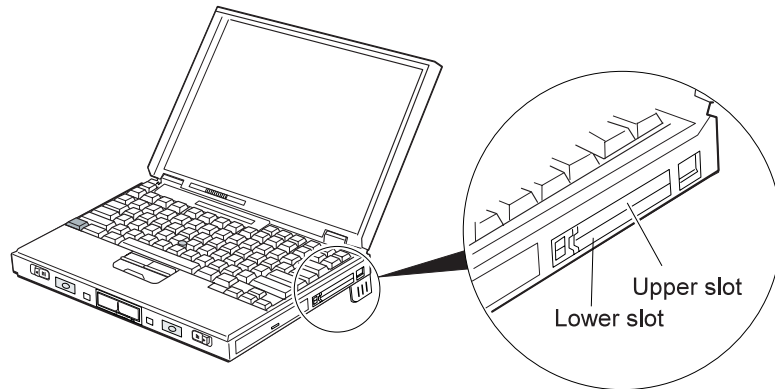


NOTE

If you are using a Type I or Type II PC Card, insert it into either the upper slot or the lower slot.

If you are using a Type III PC Card, insert the card into the lower slot.

3 Press the PC Card firmly into the connector.



For Windows 98:

If you have not installed the PC Card driver, Windows 98 starts to install it.

For Windows NT:

Your computer has PC Card support software called CardWizard. You can use the PC Card as soon as you insert the card into the computer. The “SystemSoft CardWizard” window appears and informs you about the new card.

You have completed setting up the PC Card, and you can now use it. For information on how to use the PC Card software ➡ “Basic” in the *Online User's Guide*.

Installing a PC Card

Removing the PC Card



Do not remove a PC Card while the computer is in suspend mode or hibernation mode. Otherwise, the system might hang when resuming.

Before removing storage PC Cards, such as the hard disk PC Card, Flash memory PC Card, or SRAM PC Card, from the PC Card slot, **you must stop** the PC Card. Otherwise, data on the PC Card might be corrupted or lost.

1 Stop the card.

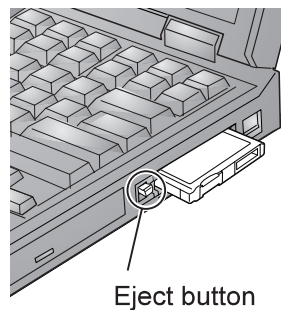

The **Stop** option appears in gray when you are in CardSoft mode or when the card is already stopped.

2 Press the PC Card eject button to pop out the button. Then press it again until the PC Card pops out.

3 Remove the PC Card and store it safely for future use.



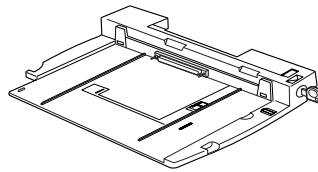

You can extend the capabilities of your computer by attaching it first to the SelectaBase 770 port replicator and a docking station.

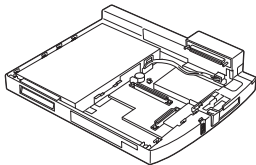

You can dock your computer to a docking station under the following conditions:

- With your computer powered off (*cold docking*)
- With your computer in suspend mode (*warm docking*)
- With your computer operating (*hot docking*)

Using a Docking Station



NOTE

Depending on the hardware configuration or the operating system, warm docking or hot docking might not be supported. Refer to the user's guide shipped with these docking stations or a port replicator for instructions on how to dock your computer to a docking station.

You might not be able to read the status indicator or access the UltraBay II easily on the SelectaDock I docking station after you dock it with the SelectaBase 770 port replicator.

In the Windows 95, Windows NT, Windows 3.1, or DOS environment, you need to install the PC Card support software *after* docking your computer to the docking station. If you have already installed the PC Card support software, uninstall it and then reinstall it after you dock your computer to the docking station.

Docking with Your Computer Powered Off (Cold Docking)

You should dock with both your computer and your docking station powered off if:

It is the first time you are docking your computer to the docking station.

Or:

You have changed the device configuration of your docking station, such as when you have installed or removed a device.

Cold docking resets the docking station's device status recorded on your computer. Thereafter, you can dock your computer with the docking station at any time.

To dock the computer for the first time, do the following:

1 Install new devices in the docking station.

2 Connect the AC Adapter.

If you use a SelectaDock I or SelectaDock II docking station, connect the AC Adapter to both a docking station and a SelectaBase 770 port replicator.

If you use a SelectaDock III docking station, connect the AC Adapter to a docking station.

Using a Docking Station

If you use a PC Card Enabler or PC Card Enabler with Advanced EtherJet Feature, connect the AC Adapter to the SelectaBase 770 port replicator.

3 Dock your computer to the docking station.

See the user's guide shipped with the docking station for how to dock your computer to it. If you use the SelectaDock I, SelectaDock II, or SelectaDock III docking station, the docked status  appears on the docking station status indicator, showing that the computer is properly docked.

4 Power on the computer.

Windows 98 or Windows 95 begins to check the status of the docking station and restarts a couple of times. Follow the instructions that appear on the screen.

During this operation, Windows 98 or Windows 95 creates a configuration profile for the docking station with the name *Dock X*.



X can be any number from 1 to 3.

The message "Version Conflict" might appear on the screen. Answer **Yes** to the prompt "Do you want to keep this file?"

5 In Windows 98 or Windows 95, select **My Computer**, **Control Panel**, **System**, and then the **Hardware Profile** tab.

6 Make sure the new profile, Dock X, is created. Also, select the **Device Manager** tab and make sure that the new devices are displayed in the device list.

If Dock X is not created, repeat from step 1.

If the symbol "!" or "x" appears next to the device symbol, a resource conflict might have occurred. Resolve the problem by referring to "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the *Online User's Guide*.

After the new hardware profile Dock X is created, you can dock or undock your computer to the docking station while power is on.

Using a Docking Station

Undocking When Your Computer Is Powered On or in Suspend Mode (Hot or Warm Undocking)



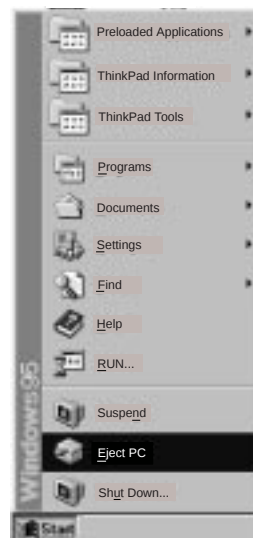
If your computer does not enter suspend mode while it is docked in the docking station, do the following:

1. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program.
2. Click on the **Power Management** () button.
3. Click on the **Suspend/Resume Options** tab.
4. Put a check mark in the **Suspend/hibernate while docked** check box by clicking on it.

Your computer can now enter suspend mode while docked.

To undock your computer from the docking station when the computer is operating (*hot undocking*) or when the computer is in suspend mode (*warm undocking*), do the following:

- 1** Select **Start** in Windows 98 or Windows 95, and then **Eject PC**. The LCD screen on your computer powers off and on.



Using a Docking Station

Or:

Turn the security key of the docking station to the eject position and release the key.

An eject request is made to the operating system. It might take some time for this eject operation to end.



NOTE

To see if the eject operation is complete, click on **Start** again and see if the **Eject PC** icon still appears. If the icon still appears, wait until it disappears.

- 2 When you hear a beep, turn the security key to the rear again. Now you can eject your computer from the docking station.



NOTE

If the operating system rejects the eject request, a message appears on the screen. If this happens, try *cold undocking*.

Presetting a Device to Avoid a Resource Conflict

The Windows 98 or Windows 95 plug-and-play function enables you to use devices that you install in the docking station immediately after you power on your system. If you cannot use them, a system resource conflict might have occurred. Do the following to resolve the conflict:

For a PCI adapter or an internal SCSI device:

- 1 Start the ThinkPad Configuration program and click on the **Docking Station** () button.
- 2 Assign at least one IRQ value. The default setting is IRQ 9.

For an ISA adapter card:

- 1 Open Windows 98 or Windows 95 Device Manager and check the resources available for the new card.
- 2 Disconnect the AC Adapter from the SelectaBase 770 port replicator.

Using a Docking Station

- 3 Set the jumper or the DIP switches on the adapter card.

For an IDE device such as a hard disk drive or a CD-ROM drive:



Before you do the following steps, read "Enabling the IDE Drive on the Docking Station"

- 1 Start the ThinkPad Configuration program and click on the **Docking Station** () button.
- 2 Click on the **IDE Device** tab.
- 3 Select **Enable** in the **UltraBay II IDE device in the Docking Station** list box (if you haven't already), and restart the computer.
- 4 Click on **Device Manager** and check whether there is a resource conflict between the new IDE device and the other devices in the computer. If there is a resource conflict, see the *Online User's Guide*.

Enabling the IDE Drive on the Docking Station

If you have installed an IDE device (such as a hard disk drive or a CD-ROM drive) in the docking station, you must change the setting on your computer to enable the device. By default, your computer uses the primary IDE channel for the primary hard disk drive (Primary-Master) and the secondary IDE channel for a device in the UltraBay II (Secondary-Master). You cannot use the IDE device in the docking station in this default **2-channel default IDE mode**.

To enable an IDE device in the docking station, you must change the default setting to either of the following:

3-channel IDE mode. In this mode, you can still use the hot and warm swap functions for a device in the UltraBay II. An additional IRQ for the third IDE channel is required.

2-channel IDE mode. In this mode, you do not have to assign an extra IRQ. However, you cannot use hot and warm swap functions for a device in the UltraBay II.

Using a Docking Station



If you change the IDE channel configuration, the drive letter assignment might be changed.

Setting to 3-Channel IDE Mode

- 1** Open the **ThinkPad Configuration** program.
- 2** Click on the **Docking Station** () button.
The “Docking station” window appears.
- 3** Click on the **Device Manager...** button.
The “System Properties” window appears.
- 4** Click on **Computer**; then click on the **Properties** button.
- 5** Determine an available IRQ value other than IRQ 11 or 15 (IRQ 9 is recommended) by checking the current setting under the **View Resources** tab. If there is no available IRQ value, remove a device that is not currently being used by clicking on the device and the **Remove** button under the **Device Manager** tab.
- 6** Click on **OK** to close the “System Properties” window.
- 7** Return to the “Docking station” window; then click on the **IRQ Holder for PCI Steering** tab.
- 8** Change the IRQ value in **1st IRQ** to the available value you determined in step 5.
- 9** Click on the **IDE Device** tab.
- 10** Select **Enable** in the **UltraBay II IDE device in the docking station** list box.
- 11** Select **Third** in the **IDE Channel** list box.
- 12** Click on **OK** to close the “Docking station” window.

Using a Docking Station

- 13** Restart the system by clicking on **OK** in the warning dialog box.

Setting to 2-Channel IDE Mode

- 1** Open the **ThinkPad Configuration** program.
- 2** Click on the **Docking Station** () button.
The “Docking station” window appears.
- 3** Click on the **Device Manager...** button.
The “System Properties” window appears.
- 4** Click on **Computer**; then click on the **Properties** button.
- 5** Determine an available IRQ value other than IRQ 11 by checking the current setting under the **View Resources** tab. If there is no available IRQ value, remove a device that is not currently being used by clicking on the device and the **Remove** button under the **Device Manager** tab.
- 6** Click on **OK** to close the “System Properties” window.
- 7** Return to the “Docking station” window; then click on the **IRQ Holder for PCI Steering** tab.
- 8** Change the IRQ value in **1st IRQ** to the available value you determined in step 5.
- 9** Click on the **IDE Device** tab.
- 10** Select **Enable** in the **UltraBay II IDE device in the docking station** list box.
The third IDE is automatically selected.
- 11** Select **Second** in the **IDE Channel** list box.
- 12** Click on the **Disable Devices** button in the warning dialog box.

13 Click on **OK** to close the dialog box.

14 Restart the system by clicking on **OK** in the warning dialog box.

Warm swap means to replace a device while your computer is in suspend mode.

Cold swap means to replace a device while the computer is powered off. Your computer supports cold swap for all devices.

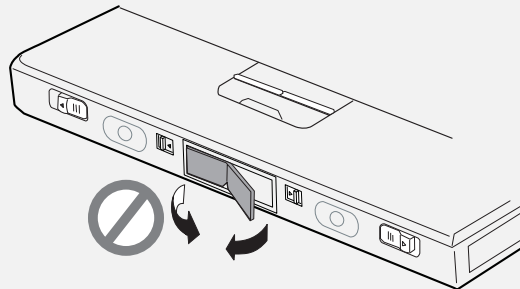
Replacing an UltraBay II Device

Your computer has a bay LED that indicates when you can safely remove a device from the UltraBay II.



If you hot-swap a device during communication using the built-in modem or PC Card modem, communication might stop. Hot-swap the device only after finishing communication.

You can use only one eject lever at a time. When opening an eject lever, make sure that the other eject lever is closed.

Green	You can remove a device from or install a device in the UltraBay II.	No beep
Blinking green	Removal or installation is in process.	No beep
Black (off)	A device is operating normally in the UltraBay II, or there is no device in the UltraBay II.	No beep

Push back the bay eject lever. A device (such as a hard disk drive) is about to be installed, but the <i>hot</i> and <i>warm</i> swap function is not supported. Do not install the device. Push back the bay eject lever, and power off your computer; then install the device.	A short beep followed by a continuous beep
Orange	A device that was not supposed to be removed (such as a hard disk drive) was removed. The computer might be damaged.	A long beep



NOTE

If you want to swap the device in the UltraBay II, release the bay eject levers; a message appears. Make sure the bay LED stays green and there is no beep; then swap the device. If the bay LED is blinking orange, do not attempt to swap the device.

For Windows 98 or Windows 95

The hard disk drive does not support the hot and warm swap functions.

For Windows NT

The hard disk drive does not support the hot and warm swap functions. In addition, the CD-ROM drive does not support the hot swap function.



NOTE

Hot or warm swap of an IDE device (CD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM drive) is not supported in 2-channel IDE mode.

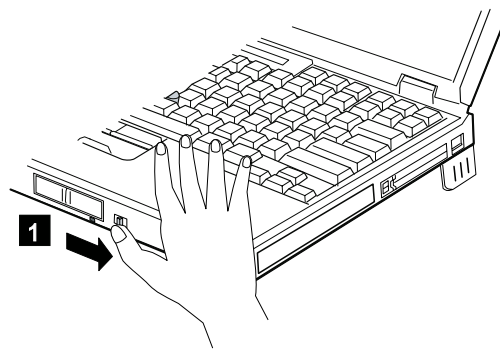

Removing and Replacing Devices

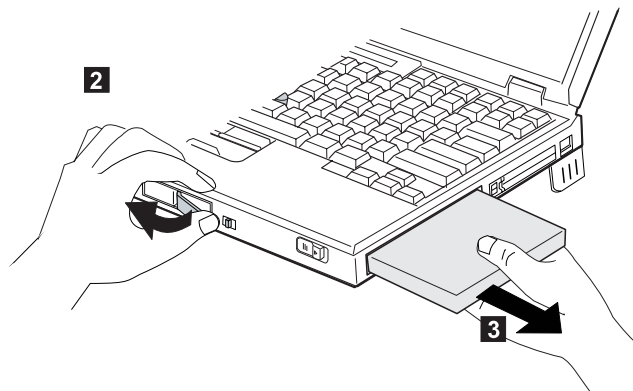
To remove a device from the UltraBay II, do the following:

- 1** If the device is a CD-ROM drive or DVD-ROM drive, remove any CD-ROM or DVD-ROM from it.

If the device is a diskette drive, remove any diskette from it.
- 2** Power off the computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 3** Slide the right release latch to the right **1**.



- 4** Gently lift up the bay eject lever **2** and remove the device from the bay **3**.

- 5 Install another device into the UltraBay II by referring to the manuals shipped with the option.

Make sure you **align the slanted edge** of the device with the slant on the UltraBay II.



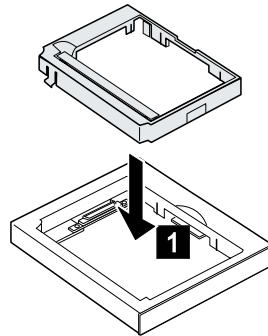

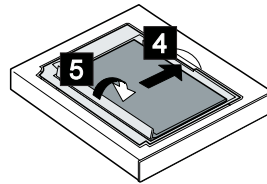

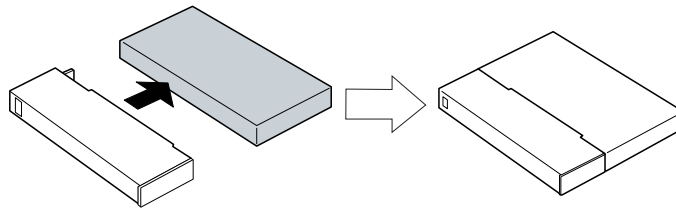

Installing the Secondary Battery Pack

Before installing a secondary battery pack into the UltraBay II, attach the battery pack to the adapter case; then insert it into the UltraBay II.

If switching from the main battery to the secondary battery:

- 1** Insert the battery pack with the secondary battery into the UltraBay II.
- 2** Make sure that the bay eject lever is locked.
- 3** Wait until the discharge symbol (▶) moves from the main battery (1) to the secondary battery (2) icon in the indicator panel.

You can now remove the main battery from the battery bay.

If changing or removing the secondary battery:

- 1** Unlock the UltraBay II.
- 2** Wait until the discharge symbol (▶) moves from the secondary battery (2) to the main battery (1) icon. It takes a few seconds.

You can now remove the secondary battery.

If the symbol does not move, the main battery (1) is not charged and you cannot remove the secondary battery.

Device Restrictions

Restrictions on some of the devices include the following:

Diskette drive:

You cannot hot swap a diskette drive in the UltraBay II if drive A is assigned to the external diskette drive. The external diskette drive is the drive connected to the system's or to the SelectaBase 770 Port Replicator's external drive port, or the one installed in the docking station.

This applies to the following conditions:

- Your system starts with the external diskette drive attached and without a diskette drive in the UltraBay II.
- You set the FDD setting to External using PS2.EXE and start your system with neither the internal drive installed (in the UltraBay II) nor the external diskette drive attached.

If you hot or warm swap the DVD-ROM drive or CD-ROM drive, make sure the drive has stopped rotating.

Other IDE devices:

- **Hard disk drive:**
You cannot use the hot and warm swap functions.
- **CD-ROM drive and DVD-ROM drive:**
You cannot use the hot and warm swap functions in 2-channel IDE mode. Refer to the table on page 89.

Battery pack:

Do not hot swap a secondary battery from the UltraBay II when the system is working under the secondary battery power. The power might go off. You might have this situation if you have the secondary battery inserted in the UltraBay II and if:

- The AC Adapter is not connected and there is no primary battery.
- The AC Adapter is not connected and the primary battery power is low.

To see whether your computer is running under the secondary battery power, see the battery status indicator on the indicator panel.

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Using Passwords

The password-setting feature helps to prevent your computer from being used by others. Once you set a password, a prompt appears on the screen each time you power on the computer. You must enter your password at the prompt. You cannot use the computer unless you type the correct password.

You can set the following passwords on your computer:

Power-on password

Set the power-on password to protect your computer from use by another person. The power-on password is required both at startup and when resuming from suspend mode.

Hard-disk-drive password

The hard-disk-drive password provides an extra measure of security. Even if you set a power-on password, another user can remove the hard disk drive in your computer and put it in a different computer to access your data. If you set a hard-disk-drive password, however, another person cannot access the data on your hard disk without knowing the password. A hard-disk-drive password provides the following security features:

- You need to type the hard-disk-drive password at startup.
- If the hard disk drive is moved to another computer, the hard-disk-drive password must be typed at startup. Therefore, unauthorized users cannot access your hard disk even if the drive is removed from the computer.
- If you have not set a supervisor password, the hard-disk-drive password is required when the computer resumes from suspend mode.
- If you put a check mark in the **Prompt for password when computer goes off standby** check box in the “Power Management Properties” window, you are required to use the Windows 98 logon password to resume from suspend mode.

Supervisor password

The supervisor password is a tool provided for the system administrator to control many ThinkPad computers. The supervisor password is set by the system administrator and it is not required for users. Users can start the computer without

Using Passwords

providing the supervisor password. The supervisor password is required only to access Easy-Setup. It provides the following security features:

- Only a system administrator can access Easy-Setup. If a supervisor password is set, a password prompt appears if you try to start Easy-Setup.
- You can use a power-on password to protect your data from unauthorized use.
- The system administrator can use the supervisor password to access the computer even if you have set a power-on password. The supervisor password overrides the power-on password.
- The supervisor password has priority over the hard-disk-drive password. The hard disk is protected by the supervisor password so that unauthorized users cannot access data on the hard disk.
- The system administrator can set the same supervisor password on many ThinkPad computers to make administration easier.

Other passwords

Some Microsoft operating systems provide special Windows passwords. Refer to that system user's guide for information on how to set, change, and use these passwords.

Entering a Password

Once you set a password, a password prompt appears at the top left corner of the screen. This prompt appears each time you power on your computer or when your computer returns from suspend mode to normal operation.

However, a password prompt is not displayed if the computer returns to normal operation because of a preset timer or an incoming call on the modem, in which case you will have to display it by pressing a key or moving the pointing device.

To enter a password, do the following:

- 1** Type your password.

Using Passwords

The  symbol appears each time you press a key. Don't hold down a key too long, because the same character will be entered continuously.

2 Press the **Enter** key.

An **OK** appears if you enter the correct password, and an **X** appears if you enter the wrong password. If you fail to enter the correct password in three tries, you must power off the computer, wait 5 seconds, and then power it on again and retry.

Setting a Password

To set a password, do the following:

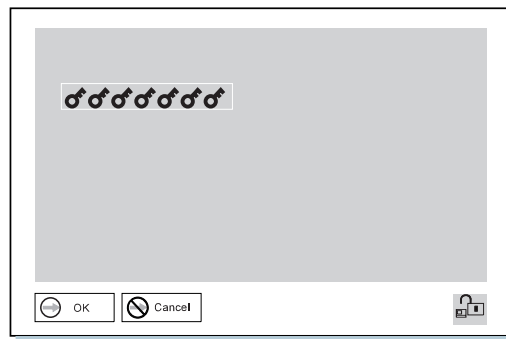
1 Start Easy-Setup.

- a) Press and hold **F1**; then turn on the computer.
- b) Hold **F1** until the "Easy-Setup" menu appears.

2 Click on **Password** in the "Easy-Setup" menu. For more information on the "Password" submenu → "Easy-Setup" on page 17.

3 Click on the type of password you want to set: **Power-On**, **HDD**, or **Supervisor**.

4 Type your desired appropriate password.

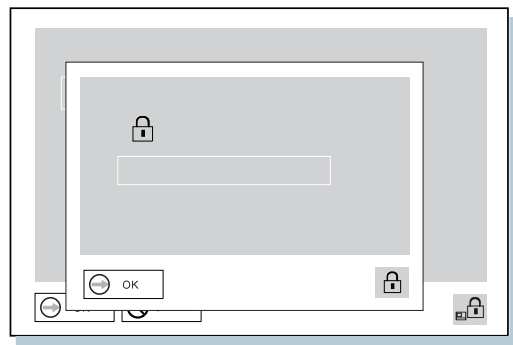


NOTE

You can type a maximum of seven random characters using a combination of letters (A to Z) and numbers (0 to 9). Uppercase and lowercase letters (for example, A and a) are treated as the same character.

If you type a wrong character, use the **Backspace** key to erase it and then type the correct one.

- 5** Press **Enter**. The “Password Confirmation” window appears:

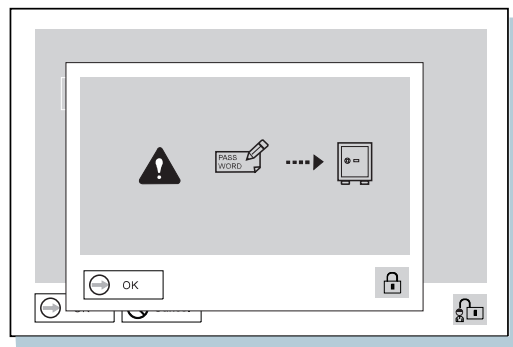


- 6** Type your password again to verify it; then press **Enter** again.



NOTE

The following window appears if you are setting the hard-disk-drive or the supervisor password, reminding you to write down the password and keep it in a safe place:



Your password is set.

Do Not Forget Your Password

If you forget your hard-disk-drive or supervisor password, there is **no way to reset your password or recover data from the hard disk**. You have to take your computer to an IBM reseller or an IBM marketing representative to have the hard disk or the system board replaced. Proof of purchase is required, and an additional charge might be required for the service. Neither an IBM reseller nor IBM marketing representative can make the hard disk drive usable.

Changing or Removing a Password

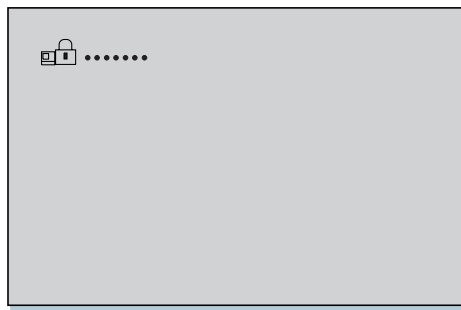
This security feature prevents someone from removing a password and using your computer. To change or remove a password, do the following:

For a Power-On Password or Hard-Disk-Drive Password

- 1** Power off the computer and wait at least 5 seconds; then power on the computer.

The password prompt appears.

- 2** Type your current password.

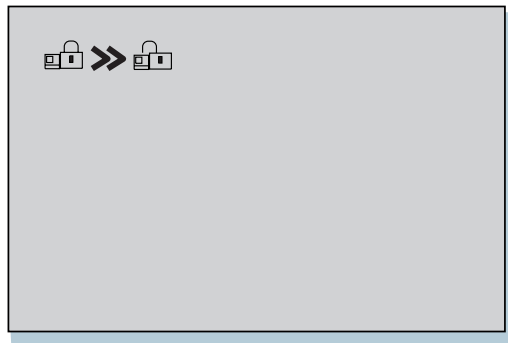


3 Press the **Spacebar**.

To change the password, go to step 4 .

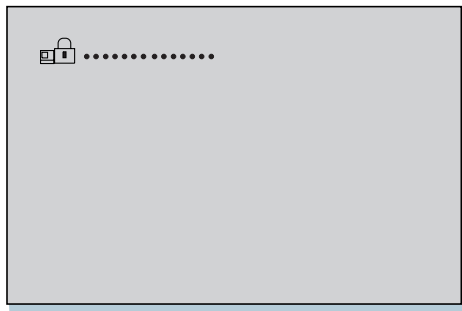
To remove the password, press **Enter**.

For a Supervisor Password

- 1** Start Easy-Setup.

The “Easy-Setup” menu appears.

3 Select **Password** on the menu.

4 Select **Supervisor**.

To change the password, go to step 8 .

5 To remove the password, enter the current password and press the **Spacebar**.

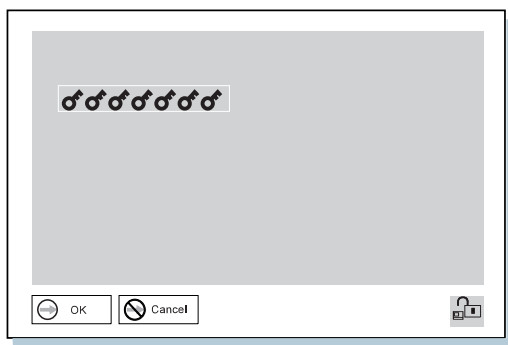

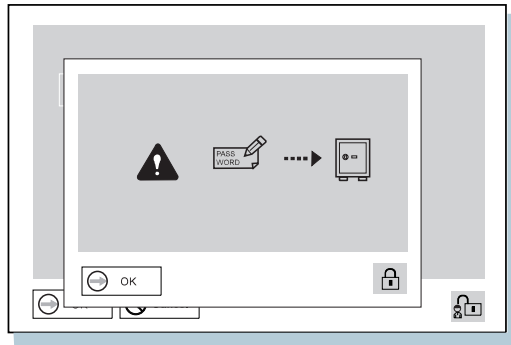

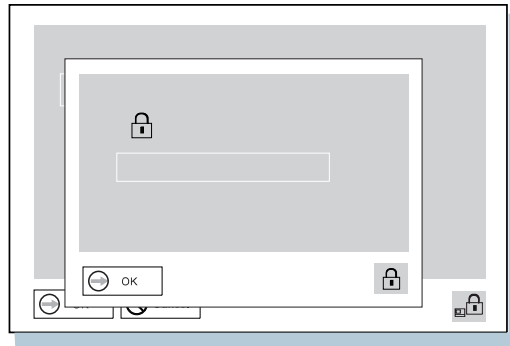
You can remove a power-on-password (even if you don't know it) if you know the supervisor password.

- 2** Enter the supervisor password.
The “Easy-Setup” menu appears.
- 3** Select **Password** on the menu.
- 4** Select **Power on** on the menu.
- 5** Type the supervisor password; then press the **Spacebar**.

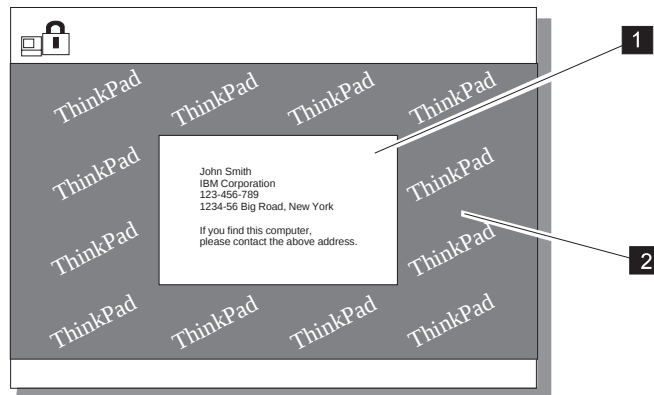

Using the Personalization Editor

With the Personalization Editor, you can display such personal information as your name and address on the screen each time you power on your computer. This feature helps you to identify your computer when identical computers are being used in your location, or to deter theft.

Entering Your Personal Data

A personalized password-prompt window consists of two parts: the *personal data area* 1 and the *background bitmap area* 2.

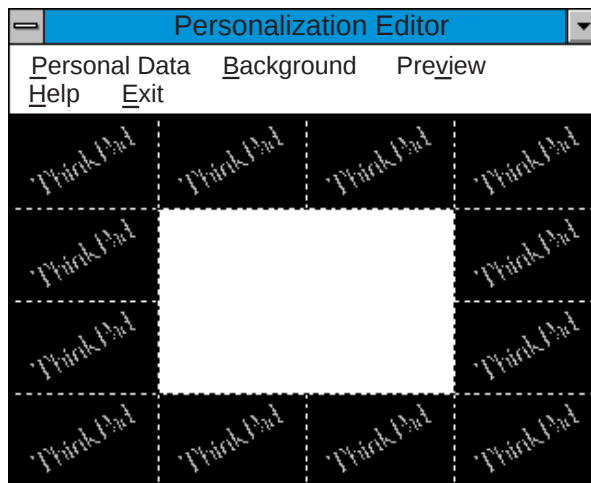
To register your name, address, and company on the Personalization Editor, do the following:



For this information to be displayed, the power-on password must already be set.

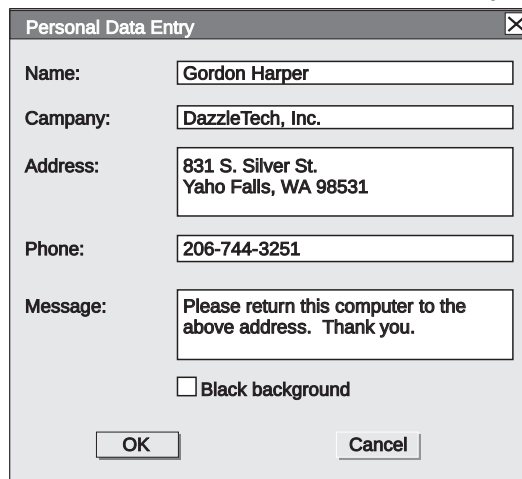
- 1** Power on the computer.
- 2** Make a backup copy of the *Utility Diskette for DOS, Personalization* with the Diskette Factory. (For more information → “Backing Up Your System” on page 32.)
- 3** Insert the backup copy of the *Utility Diskette for DOS, Personalization* into the diskette drive.
- 4** Open the **Personalization Editor**.
 - a) Click on **Start**.
 - b) Move the cursor to **Programs** and **ThinkPad**; then click on **Personalization Editor**.

- 5** Click on **Personal Data** and type the necessary information into the boxes; click on **OK** to save your data.

NOTE

To preview the actual full size of the screen, select **Preview**.

- 9** Press **Enter** to return to the previous window.
- 10** Shut down the system, and power off the computer.

11 Insert the backup copy of the *Utility Diskette for DOS, Personalization* into the diskette drive; then power on the computer.

12 Select **Update personalization data** at the menu window; then follow the instructions on the window.

Your data is copied from the *Utility Diskette for DOS, Personalization* and stored in the nonvolatile memory in the computer.

13 After the data is stored, power off the computer.

14 Set your password if you have not yet set it.

Click on **Help** for more information.

The information that you typed in will be displayed the next time you power on the computer.

Deleting the Personalization Window

To delete the personalization window and revert to the default password prompt, do the following:

1 Power off the computer.

2 Insert the backup copy of the *Utility Diskette for DOS, Personalization* into the diskette drive; then power on the computer.

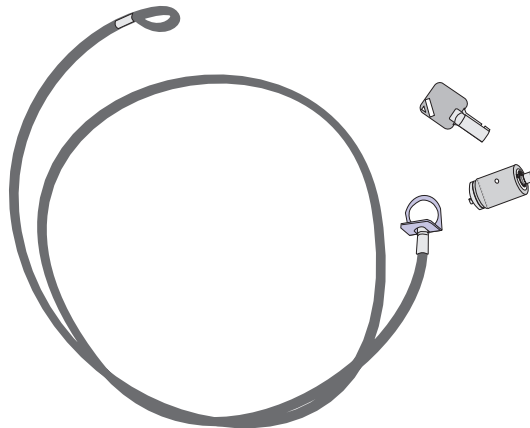
3 Select **Delete personalization data** from the menu; then follow the instructions on the screen.

4 After the data is updated, restart the computer.

Using Locks

You can attach a mechanical lock to your computer, to help to prevent it from being removed without your permission.

Attach a mechanical lock to the keyhole of the computer; then secure the chain on the lock to a stationary object. Refer to the instructions shipped with the mechanical lock. For information on the keyhole location → page 4.

Using the Security Screw

You can use the security screw shipped with your computer to prevent devices, such as a hard disk drive, from being removed easily.



Security Screw

To replace the coin screw with the security screw, do as follows:

- 1** Power off the computer; then disconnect the AC Adapter and all cables from the computer.
- 2** Remove the screw with a coin; then install the security screw and tighten it with a 2.5-mm allen wrench.
- 3** Connect the AC Adapter; then power on the computer.

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Hints and Tips

This section provides hints and tips, as well as information on limitations.



For Windows 98:

In Windows 98, it takes longer to enter suspend mode and resume normal operation than it does in Windows 95. This performance difference is a result of Windows 98, not the ThinkPad features.

Three power modes are described in this book: **standby mode**, **suspend mode**, and **hibernation mode**. You can enter these modes as follows:

- **Fn + F3** standby mode
- **Fn + F4** suspend mode
- **Fn + F12** hibernation mode

The computer also enters suspend mode or hibernation mode from other triggers. For example, if you select **Stand by** in the **Shut Down...** menu when you click on the **Start** button at the bottom left of the Windows 98 screen, you can enter suspend mode. Also, you can set the **system standby timer** in the “Power Management Properties” window to specify a timeout for entering suspend mode.



The term *standby* in the Windows 98 screen has a different meaning from the term *standby mode* in this book.

For more information → “Basic” in the *Online User's Guide*.

Hints and Tips



For Windows 95:

If you are using the Intel USB camera and the system resumes from suspend mode, the USB camera is disabled. To enable it, unplug it and plug it in again.

Because of the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive property settings, your computer might not enter suspend mode or hibernation mode after the end of a timeout period specified in the ThinkPad Configuration program when the drive is installed in UltraBay II. If you want to use suspend mode and hibernation mode, change the properties of the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive as follows:

1. Click on **Start** and move the cursor to **Settings** and **Control Panel**. Then click on **Control Panel**.
2. Double-click on **System**.
3. Click on the **Device Manager** tab, and double-click on **CD-ROM**.
4. Click on the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive name under **CD-ROM**; then click on the **Properties** button.
5. Click on the **Settings** tab and remove the check mark from the **Auto insert notification** check box in **Options** by clicking on it.
6. Click on **OK** to restart the computer.



For Windows NT:

For Windows NT 4.0, hibernation is not supported if the drive is formatted by NTFS.

If you insert a PC Card into the PC Card slot, there might be an **X** mark in the list of the card information in the "PC Card [PCMCIA] Device" window in the **Control Panel**. The **X** does not affect any function, however.

If you use the MPEG driver in Windows NT 4.0, consider the following restrictions:

- Any multimedia player application provided by a third party or a custom player application created for Windows NT is not

guaranteed to work with this driver. Only the “Media Player” application (mplay32.exe) has been tested and verified.

- If you have already installed Active Movie and Internet Explorer 3.01, included in the Windows NT 4.0 Service Pack 3, you see the following caution after installing the MPEG-2 driver and starting Windows NT again:

Caution

Some of the file types usually associated with ActiveMovie are currently associated with other programs. Because of this, you may be unable to play certain types of multimedia files. Do you want to fix this (by restoring the file type to ActiveMovie)?

Select **No** and click on **Don't ask this question again**.

- Running more than one video application sharing the same video hardware is not supported. For example, while an MPEG file is playing, the video capture application does not work. Also, you cannot play an ActiveMovie while an MPEG media player application is running.
- You can display a video window to an external monitor (CRT) or to a TV with the NTSC or PAL color standard:

The following are not supported, however:

- Any resolution/color depth at the 47/87 refresh rate
 - 800×600/16M colors with any refresh rate (video memory limitation)
 - 1600×1200/any colors with any refresh rate (video memory limitation)
 - 16 colors with any resolution or refresh rate
- While an MPEG file is playing through Media Player, suspend and resume are not supported. You need to pause or stop the playback mode before entering suspend mode.

If you enter suspend mode while playing a music CD with the “CD Player” application of Windows NT in the DVD-ROM drive, the “CD Player” window will show **No disc** in its panel after resuming normal operation, because Windows NT does not support APM mode. To recover, close the “CD Player” window and open it again; then you can play a music CD.

Hints and Tips

If you use the Video Capture driver in Windows NT 4.0, consider the following:

- Windows NT color depth changes affect the captured data (preview, overlay). Close the video capture application before changing color depth, and then restart the application.
- As a client of the ThinkPad Power Management Port driver, the Video Capture driver has power management support. You must have first installed the ThinkPad Configuration program, however. Otherwise, the driver will not function properly when the hardware changes power states. If the captured image does not appear properly, restart the capture application.
- Before running a capture application that uses this driver, close any application the uses the IBM MPEG-2 driver (for example, Media Player). Also if a capture application is running, do not attempt to start an application that uses the IBM MPEG-2 driver, or any other application that uses the capture driver.
- For preview mode, you can select image dimensions based on the available space in video memory. For overlay mode, you can choose from all sizes (40×30 to 640×480). Note the following when you use the VIDECAP32.EXE Video Capture application:
 - Size the capture display window and set a capture format so that the scrollbars are visible. Set the scrollbars to any position other than the top on the vertical scrollbar and left on the horizontal. Then resize the display window or change the capture format so that scrollbars are no longer visible. The captured image now appears split either vertically or horizontally, because VIDCAP32.EXE continues to inform the driver about the scrollbar settings, even though the scrollbars are no longer visible. To fix this, resize the display window or change the capture form so that the scrollbars are visible again, and then reset the scrollbars.
 - Select a size for overlay greater than the maximum supported for preview. The driver displays a dialog box informing you that the size selected should not be used for preview. If you change to preview mode with the

Hints and Tips

same size, the image displayed could be distorted, and the cursor might be corrupted. To fix this, select a valid size using the Video Format dialog. To restore the cursor, drag it to the bottom of the screen.

VIDCAP32.EXE assumes that preview and overlay are both supported for the same sizes. So if the application is on overlay mode, and you select preview mode without selecting a valid size, the driver is informed that it should preview to the same size. But since an image of this size cannot be captured in the frame buffer, the captured image looks distorted and the cursor image is also affected. This is also a problem if you use Digital Video Producer.

- This driver does not provide the YUV422 video codec needed for preview/capture mode application that needs to use YUV422 video compression codec. Install the YUV422 codec that is available in Windows NT 4.0 CD-ROM. YUV422 codec is available in Drvlib/Capture/I386 directory on the Windows NT 4.0 CD-ROM.
- Overlay mode is not supported for the following resolution, color depth, and refresh rate combinations:
 - 1024×768×256 colors, 43 Hz
 - 1024×768×256 colors, 87 Hz
 - 1024×768×64K colors, 43 Hz
 - 1024×768×64K colors, 87 Hz
 - 1280×1024×256 colors, 43 Hz
 - 1280×1024×256 colors, 87 Hz
 - 1600×1200×256 colors, 48 Hz
- If you connect your computer to external TV, Video Capture will not work. It works only if the display output location is either the external monitor or the LCD.
- Do not change the display output location while the Video Capture application is running.

Hints and Tips



For Windows 3.1:

If a memory shortage or memory error occurs, do as follows:

1. Unload any unnecessary drivers from the CONFIG.SYS file.
(For example, unload printer drivers if you do not use a printer.)
2. Reconfigure the UMB (upper memory block) using the DEVICEHIGH statement.
3. Use the multiple configuration setup for DOS (refer to the documents supplied with DOS).

Use the DOS command `command MEM /C` to review your DOS memory usage occasionally.

If you have installed more than 256 MB of memory, check the [386Enh] section of the SYSTEM.INI file and do one of the following:

- If the PageOverCommit line is in the file, make sure its value is 3. (If it is not, change it to 3.)
- If the PageOverCommit line is not in the file, add
`PageOverCommit=3`

After you change or add the value, shut down Windows 3.1 and power off the computer; then power it on again after 5 seconds.



The PageOverCommit value could be 2 or 1.

For more information on the PageOverCommit value  Windows 3.1 manuals.



For OS/2 Warp:

If you have formatted your drive using high-performance file system (HPFS) and your system has more than 64 MB memory installed, hibernation mode is not supported.

If the COM port does not work even though you have set it up correctly with the ThinkPad Configuration program, do as follows:

1. Open **System Setup**.
2. Select **Hardware Manager**.
3. Select a folder from the menu.
4. Select **Properties**.
5. In the default pull-down menu, select **No Hardware Detection**. If it has already been selected, change the setting.
6. Open the ThinkPad Configuration program.
7. Set the COM port as desired.
8. Restart the system.

To receive incoming faxes or mail, you must set the modem settings in the fax application to one of the following:

- Hardware FIFO enabled
- Hardware Flow Control on
- UART 16550A modem

In OS/2 FaxWorks for example, select **Utilities, Settings, Modem Type**, and **Use HW FIFO (16550A)**.

If you do not set your modem to one of these settings, you will not be able to receive an incoming fax or an incoming call in suspend mode.

If you do not have the PC Card device driver for OS/2 but you have one for DOS, your PC Card might run in the VDM (virtual DOS machine) environment. Refer to the *Online User's Guide* for setting the VDM and the sample configuration files on the PC Card Installation Diskette for OS/2, Windows 95, Windows 98. (If the PC Card Installation Diskette did not come with the computer, create it using the Diskette Factory program.)

Hints and Tips



For DOS:

If a memory shortage or memory error occurs, do as follows:

1. Try the same actions as described for Windows 3.1.
2. Unload any unnecessary programs from the WIN.INI file (for example, FUELWIN for ac operations).

You can use the ThinkPad Configuration program from the DOS prompt. To start the program, do the following:

1. Click on **Start**; then click on the **DOS Prompt** icon.

The DOS prompt window appears.

2. Type PS2 ? at the DOS prompt.

Using the Hard Disk Drive

You can use only 7.9 GB of the hard disk drive of your computer in the Windows 3.1 or DOS environment. If you install a hard disk drive with greater capacity, you cannot use all of it.

Using a Docking Station

For USB connector considerations when using a docking station, see "Using the USB Connector" on page 128.

Hot or Warm Docking to a Docking Station (Windows 95 and Windows 98 Only)

You might not be able to hot or warm dock your computer to the SelectaDock docking station when certain PCI cards, PnP ISA cards, and PC Cards are installed in the docking station. If such a condition occurs, restart the system.

Using a PC Card with the Docking Station

In the Windows 95, Windows NT, Windows 3.1, or DOS environment, you need to install the PC Card support software *after* docking your computer to the docking station. If you have already installed the PC Card support software, uninstall it and then reinstall it after you dock your computer to the docking station.

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Using the USB Connector

If your computer tries to enter suspend mode and the request is rejected, the device in the USB connector might be disabled. If this occurs, do a hot-unplug-and-plug operation for the USB device.

For PCI Cards in the SelectaDock III Docking Station: If the setting of the USB connector on your computer is enabled (the default setting), do not use a PCI Video Card and a PCI Network Card at the same time in the SelectaDock III docking station. Your system cannot boot if both cards are inserted.

For the USB Connector Setting on the SelectaDock III Docking Station: Do not disable the USB connector on the SelectaDock III. If you disable it, the system might hang during a hot- or warm-dock or -undock operation. If this occurs, restart the system.

Using the DVD-ROM Drive

Do not switch the display mode from the LCD to the external monitor while viewing a DVD with video content, such as a DVD movie or business presentation. You need to change the display mode before you open an MPEG file to play.

Using a PC Card

After your computer returns from standby mode to normal operation, you cannot perform hot-plug and -unplug operations for certain Network PC Cards in the docking station slots. Restart the system to solve the problem.

If you are communicating with a PC Card modem or inserting a PC Card in a PC Card slot, do not enter your computer into suspend mode, enter into hibernation mode, or click on **Stand by** in the "Shut Down Window" window.

Note: If you want to enter your computer into suspend mode, first stop the PC Card in the "PC Card (PCMCIA) Properties" window as follows:

1. Click on **Start**, move the cursor to **Settings**, and click on **Control Panel**.
2. Double-click on **PC Card (PCMCIA)**.
3. From the list, select the card you are stopping.

Hints and Tips

4. Click on the **Stop** button.

If you remove a communication PC Card from the PC Card slot and then reinsert it later, it might not work correctly. You need to restart your computer.

If you install a PC Card after replacing a CD-ROM drive with a diskette drive, and then later reinsert the CD-ROM drive, the card might lose its resource name for working. A CD-ROM drive (secondary IDE) always uses IRQ 15, but after it is replaced with a diskette drive, IRQ 15 will be free, and Windows 95 or Windows 98 will assign it to a new PC Card. But IRQ 15 must be taken over with IDE2 when a CD-ROM drive is reinserted.

Using a Second CardBus Card

If a CardBus Card is already configured in your computer, you must configure a second CardBus manually by using the Device Manager. To get to the Device Manager, click on the **System** icon in the Control Panel.

Using a Microphone

If you are using a microphone with your computer, use the ThinkPad-option headset. Some microphones, such as condenser microphones, might need a battery. See the instructions that come with the microphone.

The microphone/line-in jack of your computer supports either microphone input or line-in input but not both. You need to mute the function you don't use, as follows:

- 1** Click on **Start**.
- 2** Move the cursor to **Programs, Accessories, Entertainment**, and then **Volume Control**.

The "Master Out" window appears.

- 3** Move the cursor to the **Options** menu; then click on **Properties**.
- 4** Put the check mark in the **Line In** or **Mic** check box under the **Show the following volume controls**; then click on **OK**.

Hints and Tips

The volume control you have chosen in the “Properties” window appears in the “Master Out” window.

- 5** Put a check mark in the **Mute** check box in the column that you don't use—either **LINE** or **MIC**.

Using an External Condenser Microphone

The microphone/line-in jack supports the following type of microphones:

- A dynamic microphone
- A self-battery-powered condenser microphone

If you want to use an electric condenser microphone, you must use one that provides its own power source.

If you find your problem, go to the page indicated and do the specified action. The troubleshooting charts address problems in general, and some descriptions might not apply to your particular computer or suit your situation. Compare the features or options of your computer with this book or the shipping checklist.

Make sure that: - The keyboard/mouse cable is correctly connected to the computer. - The keyboard cable is connected to the correct side of the keyboard/mouse cable. If these items are correct, disconnect the keyboard/mouse cable from the computer and make sure that the operation of the system keyboard is correct. If the system keyboard works, have the keyboard/mouse cable or the external keyboard serviced.

Suspend or Hibernation Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The computer enters suspend mode automatically.	The computer enters suspend mode automatically when the processor temperature reaches a certain level. This is not a defect.
The computer enters suspend mode immediately after POST (the suspend indicator turns on).	Make sure that: - The battery pack is charged. - The operating temperature is within the acceptable range. Refer to Appendix A. If these items are correct, have the computer serviced.
Error 19 appears and the computer immediately powers off.	The battery power is getting low. Connect the AC Adapter to the computer, or replace the battery pack with a fully charged one.
The LCD is blank after resuming.	Check if an external monitor was disconnected while the computer was in suspend mode. Do not disconnect the external monitor while the computer is in suspend mode or hibernation mode. If no external monitor is attached when the computer resumes, the LCD remains blank and output is not displayed. This restriction does not depend on the resolution value.

The computer cannot enter hibernation mode if you are using one of the IBM communication PC Cards. Select the Monitor tab. Make sure the information is correct.

If a diskette is in the drive, make sure that: – The internal or external diskette drive is firmly connected to the computer. – The diskette contains the necessary files to start the system. – There is nothing wrong with your application program. – There is nothing wrong with the diskette. – The diskette is inserted correctly (label facing up and the metal-shutter end first) in the diskette drive. If these items are correct, have the computer serviced. If there is no diskette in the drive, have the computer serviced.

Battery Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The battery pack cannot be fully charged in 3.5 hours by the power-off charging method.	The battery pack might be over-discharged. Do the following: 1. Power off the computer. 2. Make sure that the over-discharged battery pack is in the computer. 3. Connect the AC Adapter to the computer and let it charge. If the battery pack cannot be fully charged in 24 hours, use a new battery pack. If the optional Quick Charger is available, use it to charge the over-discharged battery pack.
Your computer shuts down before the battery status indicator shows empty, –or– Your computer operates after the battery status indicator shows empty.	Repeat discharging and charging the battery pack at least three times.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
The operating time for a fully charged battery pack is short.	Repeat discharging and charging the battery pack three to six times. If you still have a problem, use a new battery pack.
The computer does not operate with a fully charged battery pack.	The over-current protective function in the battery pack might be activated. Power off the computer for 1 minute to reset this function; then power it on again.

A Hard-Disk-Drive Problem

Problem	Cause and Action
The hard disk drive makes an intermittent rattling noise.	The rattling noise might be heard when: - The hard disk drive starts accessing the data or when it stops. - You are carrying the hard disk drive. - You are carrying your computer. This is a normal characteristic of a hard disk drive and is not a defect.

CD-ROM Drive Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The CD-ROM drive does not work.	Make sure that: - The computer is powered on and a compact disc is properly loaded on the center pivot of the CD-ROM drive. (You should hear a click.) - The CD-ROM drive connector is firmly connected to the computer. - The CD-ROM drive tray is firmly closed. - The device drivers are correctly installed. If the CD-ROM drive in the docking station does not work, do the following: - Click on Start. - Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. - Click on Docking Station (. - Make sure that you checked Enable IDE device in the docking station. Note: Do not use IRQ 11 and 15 for the PCI device setting. - Click on OK.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
You hear a noise from the CD-ROM drive when the compact disc is spinning.	The CD-ROM drive cover might be bent. Have the CD-ROM drive serviced.
The CD-ROM tray does not open even if you press the CD-ROM eject button.	Insert a pin into the CD-ROM emergency eject hole and eject the CD-ROM tray.
The compact disc cannot be read.	Make sure that: The compact disc is not dirty. If it is, clean it with a CD-ROM cleaner kit. The compact disc is not defective. If it is, try another compact disc. The compact disc is placed in the tray with the label side up. The compact disc format conforms with one of the following: – Music CD – CD-ROM or CD-ROM XA – Multisession photo CD – Video CD

DVD-ROM Drive Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The DVD-ROM does not work.	Make sure that: The computer is powered on and a DVD disc or a compact disc is in the DVD-ROM drive. The DVD-ROM drive connector is firmly connected to the computer. The DVD-ROM drive tray is firmly closed. The device drivers are correctly installed. If the DVD-ROM drive in the docking station does not work, do the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. 3. Click on Docking Station (). 4. Make sure that you checked Enable IDE device in the docking station. Note: Do not use IRQ 11 and 15 for the PCI device setting. 5. Click on OK.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
You hear a noise from the DVD-ROM drive when the DVD is spinning.	The DVD-ROM drive cover might be bent. Have the DVD-ROM drive serviced.
The DVD tray does not open even if you press the DVD eject button.	Insert a pin into the DVD emergency eject hole and eject the DVD tray.
The DVD cannot be read.	Make sure that: The DVD is not dirty. If it is, clean it. The DVD is not defective. If it is, try another DVD. The DVD is loaded on the center pivot of the DVD-ROM drive with the label side up. (You should hear a click.) The DVD format conforms with one of the following: – Music CD – CD-ROM or CD-ROM XA – Multisession photo CD – Video CD – DVD-ROM (DVD-video)

Infrared Communication Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
Your computer cannot communicate with other devices using the infrared port.	Make sure that: The communication speeds are the same. The infrared ports are clean. No objects are between the computer and the communicating device. The distance and angle between your computer and the device is within the specified range. You are not operating under direct sunlight. The infrared port is not directly facing the other communicating port. Communication is not impeded by light from the computer's LCD. To avoid this, open the LCD to a wide angle. The communication application running on your computer is compatible with that running on the other computer. Refer to the application manuals for more information.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
Incorrect data is sent between your computer and a communicating device.	Make sure that: - The distance and angle between your computer and the device is within the set range. - The communication speeds are the same. - There are no other devices that radiate infrared rays, such as remote-controlled devices or wireless headphones, near your computer or the communicating device. - You are not operating under direct sunlight. - No fluorescent lamps are near your computer or the communicating device.
You cannot use DMA channels for both the parallel connector and the infrared port.	If you enable ECP and choose DMA3 (the default value) for the parallel connector, you might be prompted if you want to disable DMA for the infrared port. To use DMA channels for both the parallel and infrared ports, do the following: 1. Click on OK to disable DMA for the infrared port. 2. Close a parallel port panel. 3. Click on the Infrared device button to open the infrared panel. 4. Choose DMA0 or DMA1 for infrared port on the panel. 5. If you see the panel prompting if you want to disable DMA for an audio device, click on OK.

An Enhanced Video or MPEG Problem

Problem	Cause and Action
The Enhanced Video function or the MPEG function does not work.	Make sure there are no resource conflicts (IRQ or I/O address). Enable the Enhanced Video or MPEG function by doing the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. 3. Click on Video Capture/TV out (. 4. Make sure that at least one IRQ is assigned for the PCI devices. If you find a conflict with other devices, change the IRQ value. (See "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the <i>Online User's Guide</i>). The MPEG playback and the video capture functions use the same hardware resources. Only one of the two functions can be used at the same time. Likewise, two MPEG functions cannot be used at the same time.

Audio or Telephony Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The volume of the WaveTable MidiSynth device cannot be controlled.	Use the Serial-in control in the volume control panel to control the volume.
The voice quality over the Voice-Over-Data communication is poor.	Due to limitations of the ThinkPad modem, the voice quality that is transmitted and received over the Voice-Over-Data communication is not as good as with a normal telephone line. There may be momentary voice discontinuities, delays, or distortions.
Other problems.	Problems might be due to such other factors as: - Incompatibility between the ThinkPad Modem feature and other adapter cards in the docking station. To isolate this problem to a card or device, remove the adapter cards in the docking station one by one, and run the Easy-Setup "Test" submenu. - The telephone cable configuration is not correct for your application. - The telephone cable is defective. - The telephone is defective. - The audio cable configuration is not correct for your application. - The audio cable is defective. - The audio equipment is defective.

Troubleshooting Charts

A Universal Serial Bus (USB) Problem

Problem	Cause and Action
A device connected to the USB connector does not work.	Do the following: 1. Make sure that the USB device is connected correctly. 2. Open the "Device Manager" window, and make sure that the USB device setup is correct, and that the computer resource assignment and device driver installation are correct. Note: To open the "Device Manager" window, click on Start and move the cursor to Settings and Control Panel. Double-click on Control Panel, and System. Then click on the Device Manager tab in the "System Properties" window. Refer to "Testing Your Computer" on page 164 and run the Easy-Setup "Test" submenu for diagnostic test of the USB connector.

PC Card or Built-in Modem Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The internal modem does not work when you start your computer from an operating system other than Windows 95.	The operating system might be sharing the same IRQ levels as your modem. The ThinkPad Modem software might not work under these conditions. You must cancel the IRQ shared condition to use the modem. To cancel the IRQ shared condition → <i>Online User's Guide</i>.
My modem application does not work with the ThinkPad modem.	Make sure that the internal modem port is enabled by opening the "Device Manager" window and running the Modem Wizard or by opening the ThinkPad Configuration program and doing as follows: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. 3. Click on Internal Modem (). 4. Select Enable. 5. Click on OK.
Your PC Card modem does not work.	Make sure that the infrared port is disabled and the modem is set up correctly by following the instructions in this book or manuals shipped with your PC Card modem.

Other PC Card Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The PC Card shows "Ready," but it does not work correctly.	Make sure that: The system resources reserved for the PC Card do not conflict with other system devices. Refer to "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the <i>Online User's Guide</i>. The resources reserved for the PC Card match the settings in the application program. If you are using a modem card, check the COM number, I/O port address, and IRQ level. If you are using a network card, check the I/O port address, IRQ level, and memory window address. To check the resources assigned to the PC Card, click on PC Card Slots and the Allocated Resources tab in the ThinkPad Configuration program.
A system resource conflict occurred when a PC Card was used.	See "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the <i>Online User's Guide</i> .
PC Card support software does not recognize your PC Card.	Make sure that: If the PC Card is not a modem, an ATA, a Flash, or an SRAM card, you have the proper client device driver for the card. In Windows 95, the PC Card must have an INF file associated with it. Your PC Card supports PCMCIA Release 2.0, 2.01, or 2.10. Refer to the manual that came with your PC Card. If your PC Card does not support PCMCIA Release 2.0, 2.01, or 2.10, you cannot use PC Card Director. Contact your PC Card supplier. Your PC Card is working by following the diagnostic instructions for your PC Card, if any.
The PC Card is recognized by PC Card support software, but the "Not Ready" or "Not Configured" message is shown.	Make sure that: The PC Card enabler is installed. Refer to the manuals supplied with your PC Card. If the PC Card is not a modem, an ATA, a Flash, or an SRAM card, you have the proper client device driver for the card. In Windows 95, the PC Card must have an INF file associated with it. The resources for the PC Card are correctly reserved. Refer to "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the <i>Online User's Guide</i>.

The system cannot start from the PC Card.	To start from the PC Card, do as follows: 1. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program. 2. Click on the UltraBay II () button. 3. Remove the check mark from the Enable Hot/Warm Swapping of UltraBay II check box by clicking on it. 4. Click on OK. Make sure that the correct system resources are being used for the PC Card. ATA: IRQ 15 I/O 170–177h, 376h Note: The secondary IDE should be disabled. RPL (Token Ring): IRQ 9 Memory: D6000–DBFFFh I/O A20–A23h RPL (Ethernet): IRQ 5 Memory D2000–D7FFFh I/O 300–31Fh
The PC Card is installed and configured, but it does not work.	Modem card: Make sure all settings in the “Modem Control” panel and in your communication application correspond and are correct. SCSI card: Make sure the correct driver for the SCSI card is installed. Note: SCSI cards can be inserted while you are operating your computer; however, it is recommended that you insert them at boot time. Network card: Make sure all network components are correctly installed. Combo card: Make sure the correct driver for the Combo card is installed. Restart the system, and then insert the Combo card.

Move the cursor to Settings; then click on Control Panel. 3. Double-click on the ThinkPad Configuration icon. 4. Click on Power Management. The "Power Management Properties" window appears. 5. Click on the Power Mode tab. 6. Make sure Battery is selected in the Power Source list box. If it is not, select Battery. 7. Click on the Customized radio button. 8. Select Maximize in the Processor speed list box under Setting details. 9. Click on OK to apply the change.

Docking Station or Port Replicator Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The IDE CD-ROM drive or the hard disk drive in the docking station does not work.	Make sure that the system resources of the secondary IDE device in the docking station do not conflict with the system resources of the other devices. Do the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. 3. Click on Docking Station () , and put a check mark () in the Enable IDE device in the docking station check box by clicking on it. Note: Do not use IRQ 11 and 15 for the PCI device setting. 4. Click on OK.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
The MIDI connector on the port replicator does not work.	To enable the MIDI connector of the port replicator, use the ThinkPad Configuration program. Make sure that the MIDI connector is enabled by doing the following: 1. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program. 2. Click on MIDI/Joystick Port. 3. Confirm that the MIDI connector is enabled. If not, click on Enable; then click on OK. 4. Close the ThinkPad Configuration program and restart the computer. Note: When you restart the computer, you might need to install the MIDI driver. Follow the instructions on the screen and install the device driver for your computer's operating system.
The computer hangs when you power on or resume operation.	Make sure that: - The AC Adapter is connected to the port replicator or docking station by following the instructions described in this book. - The power-on indicator of the port replicator or docking station is on. - The computer is securely attached to the port replicator, or the computer and the port replicator are securely attached to the docking station. If there is still a problem, refer to the manuals shipped with the port replicator and docking station.
The PC Card installed in a port replicator is not recognized and the PC Card slots are unusable.	Make sure that: - The AC Adapter is connected to the port replicator. - The power-on indicator of the port replicator is on. - The computer is securely attached to the port replicator. This problem might happen when you reinstall Windows 98, or when you initialize the system with Easy-Setup.

A Printer Problem

Problem	Cause and Action
The printer does not work.	Make sure that: The parallel port is enabled. 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Programs and ThinkPad; then click on ThinkPad Configuration. 3. Click on Parallel Port (. 4. Select Enable. 5. Click on OK. The printer is powered on and ready to print. The printer signal cable is connected to the correct connector of your computer. If these items are correct and the printer still does not work, run the tests described in the printer manual. If the tests show that the printer is OK, have the computer serviced.

External Monitor Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
The external monitor is blank.	Do the following: 1. Connect the external monitor to another computer to make sure it works. 2. Reconnect the external monitor to your computer. 3. Refer to the manual shipped with the external monitor to check the resolutions that are supported. 4. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program. 5. Select one of the Display Device buttons on the toolbar in the ThinkPad Configuration program: - If the external monitor supports the same resolution as or a higher resolution than the LCD, click on CRT Display Only or Both LCD and CRT Display. - If the external monitor supports a lower resolution than the LCD, click on CRT Display Only. (If you click on the Both LCD and CRT Display, the external monitor screen will be blank or distorted.)

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Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
You cannot set a higher resolution than the present one on your external monitor.	Make sure that: The display driver is installed correctly by doing the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Settings and Control Panel. 3. Click on Control Panel, and then double-click on Display. 4. Select the Settings tab in the "Display Properties" window. 5. (Windows 98) Click on Advanced... (Windows NT) Click on Display Type. Make sure that the ThinkPad display driver is installed in the adapter information window. 6. Click on the OK button. If you are not sure that the display driver is installed correctly, reinstall it. An appropriate monitor type is selected by doing the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Settings and Control Panel. 3. Click on Control Panel, and then double-click on Display. 4. Select the Settings tab in the "Display Properties" window. 5. Click on the Advanced... button. 6. Click on the Monitor tab. 7. Click on the Change... button. The "Update Device Driver Wizard" appears. 8. The screen is unreadable or distorted.	Make sure that: The display driver is installed correctly by doing the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Settings and Control Panel. 3. Click on Control Panel, and then double-click on Display. 4. Select the Settings tab in the "Display Properties" window. 5. (Windows 98) Click on Advanced... (Windows NT) Click on Display Type... Make sure that the ThinkPad display driver is installed in the adapter information window. The monitor is set correctly by doing the following: 1. Click on the Advanced... button in the Settings tab in the "Display Properties" window. 2. Click on the Monitor tab. Make sure you choose the correct monitor. 3. Click on OK to close the window. An appropriate refresh rate is selected by doing the following: 1. Click on the Advanced... button in the Settings tab in the "Display Properties" window. 2. Click on the Adapter tab. 3. Select the correct refresh rate for your monitor. If you are not sure, select Optimal. If the settings are correct, run the tests described in the manual supplied with the external monitor. If the tests show that the external monitor is OK, have the computer serviced.
Wrong characters appear on the screen.	Did you install the operating system or application program with the correct procedure? If you did, have the external monitor serviced.

Troubleshooting Charts

A Television Problem

Problem	Cause and Action
The screen is blank.	Make sure that: You enabled the television settings. You need to enable the settings every time you start your computer to use the TV as the secondary display with the dual display function. You enabled the video-out connector (TV out) by doing the following: 1. Click on Start. 2. Move the cursor to Settings and Control Panel; then click on Control Panel. 3. Double-click on Display. 4. Select the Settings tab. If you see only one display icon in the "Settings" window, enable it  "Using the Dual Display Function" on page 74. If you need to set the TV Output Standards and Output Selection in the procedure, make sure that you select the appropriate radio button under TV Output Standards box, and the Composite radio button under Output Selections box.

Other Option Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
An IBM option that you just installed does not work.	Make sure that: The option is designed for your computer. The option was installed according to the instructions supplied with the option or this book. Other installed options or cables are not loose. There is no I/O address or interrupt level (IRQ) DMA channel conflict. To see the system resource status, start the ThinkPad Configuration program and click on the respective device buttons. If the test program for the option did not find the problem, have the computer and option serviced.

Troubleshooting Charts

Problem	Cause and Action
An IBM option that used to work no longer works.	Make sure that: - The option is securely connected to your computer. - The option passes its own test. If the option came with its own test instructions, use those instructions to test the option. - There is no system resource conflict (→ "Resolving System Resource Conflicts" in the <i>Online User's Guide</i>). If these items are correct and the test program did not find the problem, have the computer and option serviced.
The serial connector does not work.	Make sure that the serial connector is enabled by doing the following: For Windows 98: 1. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program. 2. Click on Serial Port (. 3. Select Enable. 4. Click on Device Manager. 5. Check the ports in the "Device Manager" window and make sure the settings are correct. 6. Click on OK. For Windows NT: 1. Start the ThinkPad Configuration program. 2. Click on Serial Port (. 3. Select Enable; then select COM1, COM2, COM3, or COM4. 4. Click on OK.

Troubleshooting Charts

Software Problems

Problem	Cause and Action
An application does not run correctly.	Check the following to make sure that the problem is not being caused by the application: - Your computer has the minimum required memory to run the application. Refer to the manuals supplied with the application. - The application is designed to operate with your operating system. - Other applications run correctly on your computer. - The necessary device drivers are installed → “Advanced” in the <i>Online User's Guide</i>. - The application works OK when it is run on some other computer. If an error message appears when you are using the application program, refer to the manuals supplied with the application. If these items are correct and you still have a problem, contact your place of purchase or a service representative for help.
The main window bitmap in the ThinkPad Configuration program is distorted (Windows NT only).	Installing the Active Desktop, bundled with Internet Explorer Version 4.0 on Windows NT, might cause this problem. Do one of the following: - Uninstall the Active Desktop. (Merely disabling the Active Desktop is not effective to avoid the problem.) - Close the ThinkPad Configuration program and start it again. (This is a temporary recovery.)
An MS-DOS game does not run, or it stops running.	Such problems are caused by corruption between the real mode application and the SystemSoft PCMCIA drivers providing both real mode and protect mode. If the system starts in MS-DOS mode without your changing the system configuration at the time of purchase, the corruption does not occur. Therefore, there is no problem with playing an MS-DOS game. Restart the system in MS-DOS mode, as follows: 1. Click on Start. 2. Click on ShutDown. The “Shut Down” window appears. 3. Click on Restart the computer in MS-DOS mode? 4. Click on Yes. The system restarts in MS-DOS mode. Run the game in this mode.

Other Problems

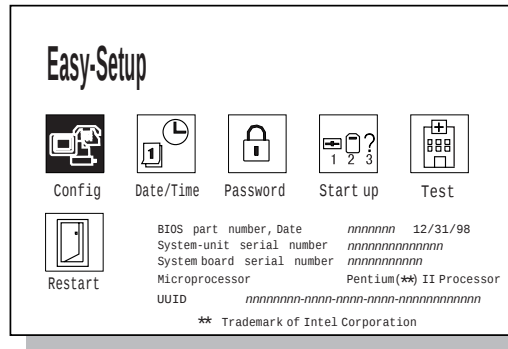
Problem	Cause and Action
The computer locks or does not accept any input.	Your computer might lock when it enters suspend mode during a communication operation. Disable the suspend timer when you are working on the network. If you power on the computer with OS/2 Warp installed, make sure no disc is in the CD-ROM or DVD-ROM drive. If there is, remove it, power off the computer and power it on again. To power off the computer, press the power shutdown switch using the tip of a ballpoint pen.
The computer does not power off with the power switch.	If the suspend indicator is on and you are working under battery power, change the battery to a fully charged one or change your power source to ac power. If you still have a problem, press the power shutdown switch using the tip of a ballpoint pen.
The computer does not start from a diskette.	Make sure that the startup sequence in Easy-Setup is set so that the computer starts from the diskette drive (see "Easy-Setup" on page 17).

Testing Your Computer

If you still have a problem with your computer after using the Troubleshooting Charts, test the computer using the **Test** function of Easy-Setup.

To test your computer, do the following:

- 1 Make sure that the speaker volume control is in the middle position.
- 2 Press and hold **F1**; then power on the computer to start Easy-Setup. Hold **F1** until the following Easy-Setup menu appears:



You will hear a short beep. If you are not sure whether you heard a beep, adjust the speaker volume. Power off the computer and try again. If you still don't hear a beep, the speaker is not working. Have your computer serviced.

Testing Your Computer

- 3** Select the **Test** icon; then select the **Start** icon or press **Enter**.



Do not touch the keyboard or the pointing device during the test.

A window such as the following appears. The devices shown in the window are associated with features and options of your computer.



If you cannot go to the next menu, have your computer serviced.

If an X appears to the left of a device with an error code below it, make a note of the error code and have the computer serviced.



If you have the SelectaDock I or II docking station as an option with your computer, you need to create the diagnostic diskette to test the SelectaDock station. This diskette replaces the diagnostic portion of existing SelectaDock I or SelectaDock II Option Diskette. Do the following:

1. Create the SelectaDock I/II Diagnostic Diskette, using the Diskette Factory program preinstalled on the hard disk.
2. Connect your computer to the SelectaDock I or II docking station.
3. Start from the SelectaDock I/II Diagnostic Diskette. Follow the instructions on the screen.
